

**PONTIACS USED ON  
SOUTHWEST EXPEDITION**

NEW YORK, July 13. — Dr. Clyde Fisher, world-renowned scientist and curator of astronomy at the American Museum of Natural History here, accompanied by his American Indian bride, Te Ata, of the Chickasaw tribe of Oklahoma, left yesterday for the southwest in pursuit of additional data on the Indian lore of the region as well as new meteorological findings around the Meteor Crater district of Arizona.

This expedition, which is the third that Dr. Fisher has made into the southwest by automobile, will also serve as a delayed honeymoon with his Indian princess bride. The doctor expects to cover some 12,000 miles this summer with the new Pontiac which he just obtained for the purpose. His two previous trips in 1927 and 1932 also were made with Pontiacs.

In 1927, in company with Ernest Thompson Seton, the naturalist Dr. Fisher made a series of authentic motion picture studies of the Indian ceremonial dances in Arizona and New Mexico. During the same expedition he took the first motion pictures of the Indian sign language with translations, using the Sioux of the Dakotas as his cast.

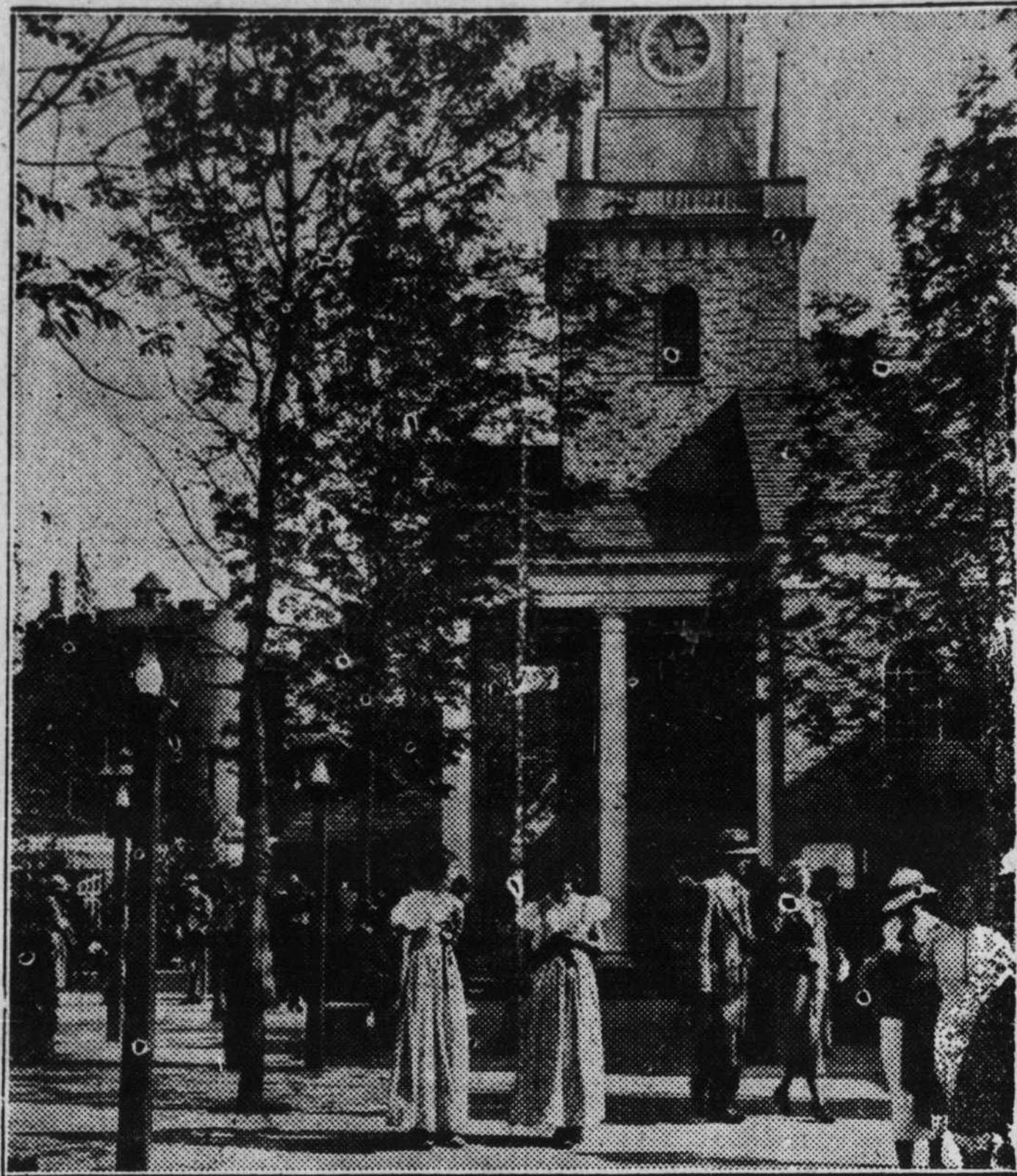
This year, the famous curator plans to continue his studies of the four-fifths mile wide and 500 deep meteor crater. Additional movies of Indian ceremonial dances will be filmed.

**ABANDONED ORE YIELDS  
WHITE METAL VALUES**

Rich silver ore abandoned 61 years ago by miners, when the white metal was demonetized, is being mined 48 miles from Goldfield by B. W. Fields and partner. Uncovered in an old workings about 45 feet below the surface after a long search, the vein ranges from 11 to 18 inches wide, is reported to be averaging in excess of \$100 per ton, and shows persistent strength as work advances.

The ore is silver sulphide with some gold present. The claims are in the South Tule district, from which producers were forced to ship their ore 300 miles to Austin by ox-team in the early years of Nevada. —Goldfield Tribune.
