kind of modern equipment, and everything was scrupulously clean. But the point of interest in the story she told was one of the unexpected outcomes.

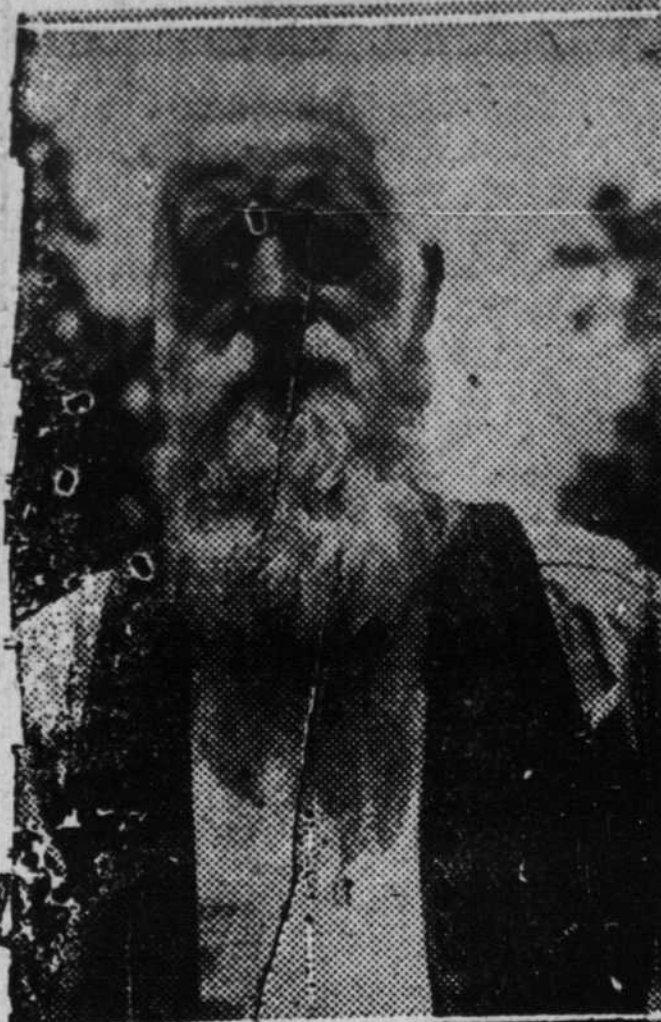
Mothers were calling her on the telephone, writing her notes, speaking to her on the street, to say that at last Harry or Helen, John or Jane, was drinking milk without a grumble. But on asking questions, I learned that the visit was not the whole story. It was a prominent factor in the children's change of attitude to be sure, but this wise teacher followed it up with a classroom project that lasted about three weeks.

The children first built a model dairy, all the time discussing the interesting features of the visit. Next, they delivered the milk, and milk, at lunch time. In connection with this, they took up the study of milk itself, and why it is called "the most nearly perfect food." There is an idea here. I call it good teaching. At any rate, the result was very worthwhile.

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lead-zinc ores, while there is also a large tonnage of iron-manganese awaiting mining.

It was estimated roughly that Lincoln county will need and use ultimately, 30,000 KW or approximately 40,000 HP of electrical energy to operate their mines and concentrate their ores ready for shipment to electro-chemical reduction plants, which, they predict, will be located near Las Vegas. The cost of a transmission line to Pioche was estimated roughly at \$1,500,000.
