Tent Classrooms For School Pupils For Time Being

The board of education decided this week that the school children of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades will attend regular classes in tent classrooms similar to those erected in Southern California following the condemnation of the school buildings after the Long Beach earthquake.

The decision to establish temporary quarters for the children was decided upon by the board to meet the apparent desire of the taxpayers to withold any further construction until after the completion of Boulder dam.

Eight tents, 24 by 40 feet in size, of the same model being used in Southern California, were ordered for immediate delivery, and will be erected on the grammar school grounds adjoining the building that burned. They are expected to be ready for occupancy by the time school starts on September 4th.

The tents will be equipped with desks and blackboards, and carry a frame superstructure sufficiently strong to resist the high winds in this area.

The board also decided to go ahead with cleaning up the debris left by the fire, and will carry this on by day labor instead of contracting for the work. This also will start immediately and is expected to be finished by the time school starts.

The cost of purchasing, erecting and equipping the tent classrooms was estimated by the board at approximately \$5,500, which is available from the portion of the insurance money which belongs to the grammar school district.
