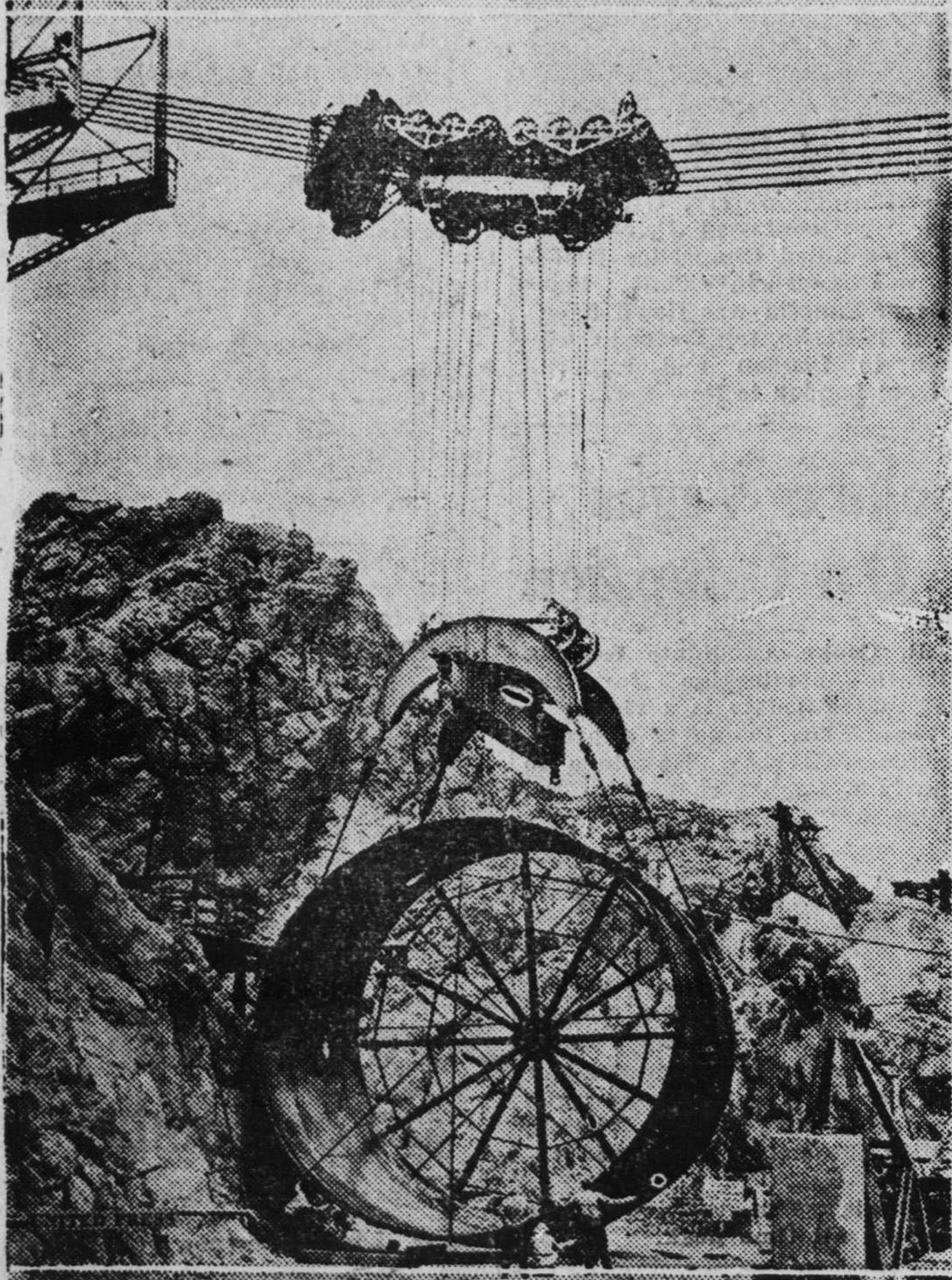

As Boulder Dam Nears Completion.



The largest section of steel pipe ever fabricated for an engineering project was placed in final position in the upper Nevada intake tower of the Boulder Canyon project recently, marking another step in the construction of the great Boulder Dam. The pipe is 30 feet in diameter, 21 feet long and weighs 90 tons.
