

Shriners to Meet In Boulder And Vegas Oct. 13th

According to arrangements being made by local and Los Angeles Shriners, plans for a gala affair, with two bands, two patrols and several hundred parading shriners is promised for Las Vegas and Boulder City on October 13th.

George Ramsey, recorder of Al Malaikah Temple in Los Angeles, who, with James Webb of Boulder City and Mike Silver of Las Vegas are making arrangements for the party here this fall.

Ramsey, with Webb and Silver arrived here the first of the week by air from Reno, where they contacted the officials of Kerak Temple there, to lay the foundation for the greatest Shrine event ever staged in the state of Nevada.

According to the present schedule, there will be between 1,000 and 1,200 Shriners from Los Angeles with the Al Malaikah band and crack patrol performing during the celebration.

It is expected that there will be at least 300 shriners from Reno to make the trip, and present arrangements call for the band and patrol from Kerak Temple to be present.

The party, according to present schedule, will arrive in Las Vegas Saturday afternoon, October 12, and will remain here until Sunday evening.

During their stay here, the combined forces of the Las Vegas—Boulder City—Los Angeles and Reno Shriners will induct a large class of neophytes across the burning sands and elaborate preparations, including a "baptism" in the Colorado river, are being made for the affair.

The ceremonial this year will be of the same type as the first one staged in Las Vegas last year by Kerak Temple, only on a larger scale.

The Los Angeles Temple has promised the arrangements committee a full membership for the affair, and a gala occasion is in the offing.

According to conservative estimates, made by Ramsey and the two local men, there will be between 2,000 and 2,500 shriners and their families in this area for the celebration, members of the temples from other cities in Nevada and Utah making plans to attend as well.

Brennan reported the purchase by Florida people of a valuable property held by George Lerchen and Johnny Berlin, who were paid a good price, Brennan said, for their holdings.

The same people, Brennan said, have bought what is known as the Johnny Bower property, located at Hot Springs, 12 or 14 miles east of Rawhide, and will put in a mill and compressor at Gold Park.

The Brucite Co. is working ten men 15 miles southeast of Broken Hills in Nye county, Brennan reported. Ore is being taken out and a car was shipped last week.

Work has been started under the direction of Jim McLaughlin, well-known mining man of Fallon, on the claims of the late Silverino Penelas, which have been acquired by Louis D. Gordon of Round Mountain.

Three houses and blacksmith shop have been moved to the property and the main shaft will immediately be sunk another 100 ft. it was reported.

McLaughlin was in Fallon the middle of the week, buying lumber and other supplies, and told Fallon friends that the Penelas property looks very good, that its development is well financed, and that a lot of work is to be done.

Mexico Will Honor Pittman

Notwithstanding the fact that he is deeply engrossed in his political campaign for reelection, United States Senator Key Pittman of Nevada will take sufficient time out to visit Nogales, State of Sonora, Mexico, Saturday, August 18th, when he will be presented by Senator Rodolfo Elias Calles, Governor of the Mexican state named, on behalf of the mining industry of that republic, a massive solid silver Aztec calendar, weighing 124 pounds, in recognition of his achievements in behalf of silver.

Senator Pittman will leave Reno next Sunday for a visit to various southern and southeastern towns of Nevada, after which he will head for the Mexican border for the ceremonies in his honor. The platform on which he will deliver his speech of acceptance of the gift will stand immediately over the boundary line separating Nogales, Arizona, from Nogales, Mexico.

Following the acceptance of the gift, Senator Pittman will have it shipped to Reno by express. It will be placed on display at a convenient location where all Renoites and Nevadans may view it.

In an article in reference to the gift, the Mexican newspaper, Excelsior, in its issue of July 28th last says:

"A beautiful present, a 'tribute to the Apostle of Silver,' according to the inscription on the base thereof, will be presented the 18th of August next to United States Senator Pittman by Sr. Rodolfo Elias Calles, governor of the State of Sonora.

"The object consists of a reproduction in silver of the Aztec Calendar, which has been exceedingly well done by the Mexican silversmiths, Jacinto Viguera and Victor Gutierrez.

"The reproduction to which we refer and which is a work of art, has a diameter of fifty-five centimeters, fifteen kilos of silver 970-1000 pure having been used in it. The calendar, the details of which have been reproduced in wood by the cabinet maker Luis Garcia, is a beautiful piece of work.

"The figures and calendar stone of silver rest upon a wooden base having a plaque with the following inscription: 'Tribute to the apostle of silver, the Honorable Key Pittman, Senator of the United States of America, offered by Sr. Rodolfo Elias Calles, Governor of the State of Sonora, on behalf of the Mining Industry of Mexico, Nogales, Sonora, Mexico, August 18th, 1934.'

"According to information given us by the artist, it took him five months to make the reproduction, which cost approximately two thousand pesos.

"The silversmith, Viguera, has been in the trade twelve years and is only twenty-five years of age. He is a native of Tlalpujahuá, Michoacán, where he learned the trade."

Collection of Garbage Set

Al Drew, superintendent of the Las Vegas garbage department, has issued instructions to be followed to insure the proper disposal of refuse within the city. Mr. Drew asks the cooperation of the people of Las Vegas in keeping the city clean. Following is the schedule of collections:

Sundays

Wet garbage from all cafes, restaurants, drug stores, grocery stores.

Mondays and Thursdays

Collections of wet garbage in section of City of Las Vegas bounded by the West side of 5th street, the east side of Main street, from Mesquite street on the north to Charleston Drive on the south.

Tuesdays and Fridays

All that portion of the City of Las Vegas east of 5th street including Oak street on the north to Charleston Drive on the south, including the Park addition to the City of Las Vegas to 15th street on the east.

Wednesdays and Saturdays

All that portion of the City of Las Vegas west of the U. P. railroad tracks to Cowboy Bill's on Clark Ave., north to Washington street with the exception of First street collections to me made the full length of 1st street. All that portion of the City of Las Vegas south of Charleston Dr. between south 5th street and the U. P. R. R. tracks, to the south city limits.

Dry schedule will be published at a later date. Residents must have their wet garbage out on these days and in suitable covered containers.
