RENO COMPANY IS NEW ORE SHIPPER AT CRIPPLE CREEK

The Reno Gold Mining & Milling Company, operating a lease on the Stratton Estate in Poverty Gulch, Cripple Creek, announces the first car of ore shipped since starting operations a few weeks ago averaged \$14.40 a ton. Two other cars are at the mill, which it is believed will show higher grade ore. These shipments were made from the New Boston claim of the Reno group.

Crews are busy in the tunnel drifting towards a known junction near a latite phonolite dike, which junction it is believed will produce good ore. Breast of the drift is now running better than \$10 per ton.

A four-drill compressor has been ordered installed and when this equipment is ready for work, additional crews will be put on to carry out an extensive development program, says the management.—Denver Miner.

LOANS AVAILABLE FOR FEED AND SEED

Regional Manager George S. Glen of the emergency crop and feed loan section, with headquarters in Salt Lake City, Utah, has written the Appeal as follows:

Loans to farmers and stockmen for the purchase of feed or seed for forage crops, are now available in counties which have been designated as "emergency" areas, and will be administered by the emergency crop and feed loan section of the farm credit administration.

In each drought-stricken county, declared as an emergency area, the federal emergency relief administration, in cooperation with this organization, has established an office, at which full information and application forms may be obtained.

In your county, which is designated a drought-stricken area, this office is located at the court house in Minden.

W. H. Stodieck, committee clerk appointed by the county federal emergency relief administration, who is prepared to issue full information and application forms to stockmen and farmers needing this relief loan.

The county loan committee appointed to pass on these loans consists of Karl Heidtman and Fred Settlemeyer of Gardnerville, and Wm. Wennhold of Minden.—Carson City Appeal.

NORTHERN NEVADA DEMOS WON'T QUIT GOV. RACE

RENO, August 10—The meeting held with the idea of having John A. Cooper, Richard Kirman, Charles Richards and Maurice J. Sullivan withdraw from the race for the Democratic nomination for governor was unsuccessful.

The effort to consolidate the northern Nevada voting strength thus failed.

All four named declined at the meeting, to withdraw from the contest.

The first meeting was held in the office of Richards yesterday, when Assemblyman John Cahill of Washoe county urged that the four withdraw and permit a new and unnamed candidate to file for the office.

It is understood that Cahill is not seeking the nomination for himself.—Carson City Appeal

DELAMAR SHIPS LARGE ORE TONNAGE

A steady flow of gold ore is coming out of the Delamar district and during the coming week the Magnolia Lease will ship its eleventh car of ore. Following the shipment of ore from the Magnolia, the Lane Lease will send out another car of gold ore from the April Fool sector, during the past week richer ore was struck in the upper tunnels, some of the quartz showing much free gold. The Smith-Acklin Lease on the Dublin mine is mining a fair grade of ore and will shortly ship a car of ore to the Salt Lake smelters. At the Horn Lease on the Jumbo Salvator claims ore is being mined and steady shipments of ore have been made during the past two years. The average of the gold ore shipped from the Delamar district is between two and three ounces of gold per ton, with a small amount of silver present.

The most productive outside property of the Delamar district is the Easter mine from which two cars of ore have been shipped during the last year and another car being mined at the present time, the Easter ore carries approximately one ounce of gold and four ounces of silver. Work is still going forward at the Peggy Lou mine under the supervision of Earl Knott, veteran mining man of Lincoln county, development work has opened up three feet of ore which is being cut at greater depth at the present time.
