

GUILD DECLARES 'DIVORCE MILL' IS ESSENTIAL

Nevada's so-called divorce mills were described by Judge Clark J. Guild as "a great benefit to mankind."

"It is only in uncivilized countries that men and women are forced by law to live in unhappiness," the judge, who recently granted Mrs. Curtis B. Dall, daughter of President Roosevelt, her divorce, said yesterday.

"Divorce is after all a mere formality giving sanction to a separation that has already been effected.

"It is inhuman to compel people to remain married when they want divorce and have bona fide reasons for separation."

T. & G. ROAD HANDLES 60 LOADS ORE IN 15 DAYS

The Tonopah and Goldfield railroad started 60 carloads of ore and concentrates to smelters and refineries from the Goldfield-Tonopah area during the first fifteen days of August, surpassing records of many months.

The loadings were from following points: Goldfield, 4; Manhattan, 8; Gilbert, 1; Blair Junction, 6; Tybo, 21; Tonopah, 14; Divide, 5; Republic, 1. Total 60.

When it is taken into consideration the road suffered severely from wash outs during the early part of August, the record is more than encouraging and is concrete evidence that mining activity throughout the district served by the line is rapidly increasing.

Ore and concentrate shipments since August 15 are holding up well, and it is expected by General Manager R. S. Titlow and officials that August business will surpass in amount the total of any month in a long period of time.
