

**VETA GRANDS GOLD GETS NEVADA MINN**

After having conducted extensive sampling, Edward J. Roberts, president of the Veta Grande Gold Mines Co., has acquired for the company a gold property embracing fourteen claims located in the southern part of Clark County, Nevada. The district is virtually a new one, just across the California-Nevada line from Nipton, a small railway town in California, on the Searchlight road leading to Las Vegas.

Reports from the property are that the ore mined in sinking the tripod shaft is being accumulated in preparation for a shipment of a 50-ton carload to a Utah smelter. The shaft is said to have started on pay ore at the surface and is now over 70 feet in depth where it shows

Situated within relatively short distance, are the El Dorado Canyon, Yellow Pine, Crescent and Searchlight districts, famed for their production of many millions. Some of these have produced, in addition to gold and silver, vanadium turquoise, platinum, molybdenum and ores carrying radium. Some of the mines of the district have developed ore running into thousands of dollars a ton.

Veins on the Veta Grande property are fissures in andesite, at places having considerable width. Pay ore open in three shafts is in the form of lenses. The whole andesite intrusion offers a new geological study, according to Engineer Roberts, who states that the entire width of several hundred feet of andesite might ultimately attract large mining interests who are interested in volume production of low grade ore. Samples have been taken across the andesite showing possibilities of mill grade ore.

**FIXES DUCK DATES**

According to a card issued by the Nevada fish and game commission the season for duck shooting will be from October 1 to January 6th, inclusive, during this period shooting will be allowed only on Saturdays and Sundays. In other words, hunting will be on October 1, and 2, and on each Saturday and Sunday thereafter up to and including January 6th. This will allow a total number of 30 days in which shooting ducks will be permitted between October 1 and January 6th, inclusive.

This information published by the fish and game commission comes as a surprise because not a great while back the federal biological survey published a statement to the effect that the duck shooting season would be for 60 days—October 1st, to November 30th, inclusive. — Ely Daily Times.
