#### STATE COMMISSION

FIXES DUCK DATES

According to a card issued by the Nevada fish and game commssion the season for duck shooting will be from October 1 to January 6th, inclusive, during this period shooting will be allowed only on Saturdays and Sundays. In other words, hunting will be on October 1, and 2, and on each Saturday and Sunday thereafter up to and including January 6th. This will allow a total number of 30 days in which shooting ducks will be permitted between October 1 and January 6th. inclusive.

This information published by the fish and game commission comes as a surprise because not a great while back the federal biological survey published a statement to the effect that the duck shooting season would be for 60 days-Octover 1st, to November 30th, inclus-
