

WHITE PINE HIGH IN PRODUCTION OF COPPER

White Pine county retained its title as banner mineral producer of Nevada last year, according to U. S. Bureau of Mines statistics for 1933, just released.

Total state production was valued at \$4,970,374, of which \$2,247,658 was credited to White Pine. Nye county ranked second with \$1,069,300, and Lincoln county third with \$636,671.

White Pine county was first in tonnage of ore treated; first in production of copper; second in production of silver. Nye county was first in production of both gold and silver, and Lincoln county was first in production of both lead and zinc and second in production of silver.

FOREST SERVICE HELPING MINERS

ELY — The U. S. Forest Service seeks the conservation of the resources of the national forest as an aid to the prospector, according to C. J. Olsen, forest supervisor. Mr. Olsen in a talk before the White Pine County Prospectors Association pointed out that the prospector and small mine owner must have water for the working of his property and likewise grazing for his peck horses or burros. In the preservation of the timber and plant life on the watersheds the water is held in streams thruout the year and an abundance of feed aids the prospector.

There is nothing more important in the West today than mining, he said, and the taking of mineral from the earth is "clean money." Today there are lots of men in the hills mining and he told of several instances of coming upon men operating homemade mills on small small properties at a profit.
