A HEADACHY PROPOSITION

Duck hunters must watch their steps this year, when they slip out in early morning, when the mists lie over the marshes and it is difficult to see what sort of ducks are swimming just beyond the fringe of tules, for it is against the law to shoot some species and federal game wardens declare hunters caught with outlawed ducks will be prosecuted regardless of the alibi offered.

State and federal laws are at variance in some ways, and it probably will be much safer for the duck hunter to remain at home by the family fireside wintry mornings after the duck season opens.

Shooting days are fewer. It is also illegal to shoot ducks half an hour before sunrise. Bag limits have also been reduced on canvas-back, redhead, eider duck, blue-wing teal, cinnamon teal, and other varieties, from 8 to 5, with no more than 10 in any hunter's possession, allowing for a two-day shoot—and then the hunter should be able to prove he did not kill the two-day quota of 10 in one day.

Before you oil up your trusty 12-gauge this fall and start out for a mess of ducks you had better acquaint yourself with all the odd quirks of the new laws, and post yourself on the different varieties. Also don't forget your state license and your federal duck stamp, which will set you back an extra buck this year.
