MINERS EAGER FOR RAIN AS WELL AS FARMERS

MIDAS, Nev., Sept. 14 — It isn't the farmer alone who is concerned over the snow and rainfall during the coming winter. In the far west the miners are as eager for the favor of Jupiter Pluvius as the agriculturalist. Water in many mining camps is a necessary for the production of gold, silver, lead and copper as it is for wheat, corn, potatoes and grass.

Low grade ore has to be put through mills and much of the waste eliminated before it will pay to ship. And the mills cannot be run without water. On the average it takes about 700 gallons of water to recover the values in one ton of ore.

During this drought year so many of the usual sources of moisture

have failed or been greatly reduced that dozens of mining companies are mining for water as eagerly as for gold or silver. A good, dependable well ranks with a new ore body.

Here in the Gold Circle district two wells have just been driven by the East Standard Mining Co., a gold producing enterprise, to keep its 60-ton mill going. Churn drills are used to reach the water level. A hole 8 inches in diameter is put down. Into this goes a casing to keep the hole open. The casing is perforated to admit any water that may be encountered. The water level attained, the engine is geared to a suction pump and the valley throbs with the chug of the pistons as they force the fluid into storage tanks above the mill.

Housing Plan To Be Explained

Frank W. Ingram, Nevada State Director of the Federal Housing Administration, will leave Reno next Thursday on a three-weeks' tour of the State to explain to bankers, business men, property owners and all other interested persons the Better Housing Program of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Director Ingram has arranged to address men and women's civic, labor, and fraternal organizations in the various towns. His explanatory remarks will be supplemented by a Visomatic machine which gives short addresses by President Roosevelt and other government officials. Director Ingram's itinerary follows:

the completion of a second well on his property. No. 1 well on the same property, 750 feet away, is down 263 feet and is producing about 6,000 gallons a day. With a total flow of 25,000 gallons a day it is thought the mill will be able to operate to full capacity on thousands of tons of \$8 to \$15 ore awaiting treatment. President Joseph estimates the net recovery from the class of ore now available at about \$4 a ton.

HUNT SEASON FOR DOVES SET

According to a card issued by the Nevada fish and game commission the season for duck shooting will be from October 1 to January 6th, inclusive, during this period shooting being allowed on Saturdays and will be on October 1 and 2 and on Sundays. In other words hunting each Saturday and Sunday thereafter up to and including January 6th. This will allow a total number of 30 days in which shooting ducks will be permitted between October 1 and January 6th inclusive.

This information published by the fish and game commission comes as a surprise because not a great while back the federal biological survey published a statement to the effect that the duck shooting season would be for 60 days—October 1st, to November 30th inclusive.
