

DUCK SHOOTERS WILL GET NEW EXPERIENCES THIS FALL

Duck hunters in Humboldt county, and every other county for that matter, are going to have some new experiences this year.

In the first place, it is going to be necessary for each and every hunter "over 16 years of age" to go to the postoffice and buy himself a stamp so that he may go hunting. Not that hunters are going to have to go hunting by mail, but the stamp purchased will provide funds for further propagation of ducks and will set the hunter back \$1.

The stamps have been received at all postoffices and are ready for sale. Any hunter who has achieved his sixteenth natal day, must buy the stamp. It is not only important that the stamp be bought but that it be retained and in order to preserve it properly, the federal regulations require that it be "affixed adhesively" to the state hunting license which all hunters must purchase. If you live in a state which does not require hunting licenses, the postoffice has a certificate on which the duck stamp may be affixed.

So much for the new duck stamps. Now, if someone will suggest where there is enough water to permit a duck to get his feet wet, the hunter can get all set to fake his stamp in hand and go hunting.

And there is where another new experience, for Humboldt county residents at least, comes in. Hunters this year are not going to be able to go out and bang away at the birds any day of the week. A new federal regulation—ducks are

migratory and therefore are regulated by the federal government through the department of agriculture — provides that hunting shall be permitted only on Saturday's and Sundays. The season opens this year on October 1 and continues until January 1. — Humboldt Star.
