

First Nevada Sheep Bought by Gov't

With a daily quota of two thousand animal, first purchases of Nevada sheep under the government's drought relief cattle and sheep buying program were made this week.

Initial sale of old ewes, the only type sheep being bought, were made to the government by Nevada sheepmen on Wednesday, when several carloads were shipped from Deeth in Elko county.

Woolles from three other counties, Lyon, Eureka, and Lander, were bought by the government on Thursday, a total of about a thousand and head going from Hundson, Eureka and Austin.

Purchases are under way in all distressed areas in the state as the week ends. Thomas Buckman, assistant director of drought relief in the state, announced today. Included are about a thousand head of Nevada sheep from the Davis creek area in Modoc county, and a similar number from southern Washoe county.

Only the most distressed areas are being served first. Buckman said, and it is expected that the week's quota of 12,000 head will take care of the worst cases.

Churchill, Elko, Humboldt, Lyon, Eureka, Lander, White Pine, Mineral, Esmeralda, and Washoe counties are expected to provide the most of the distressed animals which can be moved to shipping points quickly.

For the present, the ewes are shipped to processing plants outside Nevada, where they will be processed for use in federal relief work.

"Purchases are being made," Buckman stated, "only from those producers who have demonstrated that their feed supplies, on account of the drought, are not sufficient to maintain their animals."

Only sufficient numbers to reduce the herds to where the feed supply will carry them are being bought, he said.

by the government for the sheep bought, one half the sum to the producer for the animals and pelts of those slaughtered, and the other half to leinholders and producer jointly. If there are no leinholders, the regulations provide that the entire sum shall go to the rancher.

Ewes, not fit for use, according to Buckman, are being slaughtered on the ranch, the producer disposing of the carcass and turning over the pelt to the government.

No freshly shorn animals are being bought. Delivery of the animals to be bought and the pelts of animals condemned to a designated shipping point is required by the government.

No dead animals are being bought.
