Justice

Combining Powers

Now that the Endeavor, the British contender, has won two races to the Rainbow's one, it seems that the prospect for British success is better than ever before, although the winner must win four out of seven contests to lift the cup.

And it would not injure the sport in the minds of most of America to see the fighting Britishers take the cup back to England. On the contrary it would serve to arouse the sporting blood of America to renewed efforts to lead the world in building and operating sailing vessels.
