BELMONT COMPANY LEASES PROPERTY

TONOPAH - According to telegaphic advice received from C. A. Heller, president of the Tonopah Belmont Development Company, the board of directors of that company has ratified a lease on the company's Tonopah property to H. D. Budelman. It is understood that Budelman and his associates will operate the mine on a subleasing basis with some work on their own account.

It is planned to sublease on the same satisfactory terms and conditions as prevail in other mines of the Tonopah district. Many applications for leases have already been received at the office of the Belmont company and it is expected that within a few months at least 100 leasers will be occupied in the mine. The Belmont mine has been closed down for two years so that certain preliminary work must be done before actual mining operation can be resumed. This preliminary work has been started and it is estimated will require about 10 days to finish.

# MINING LOANS

All the great mines of today were at one time just mere prospects. This fact cannot be disputed and in light of recent events it is significant.

As the prospector roams the globe, he still finds new prospects, new fields and new minerals. Sometimes rare and precious metals are discovered by the prospector upon which great industries are builded even in times of distress. With the prospector we would lapse back into a period of stagnation we must continue to search and develop our natural resources even in times of adversity. At the last session of Congress laws were enacted providing for loans to the mining industry. It was specified in these laws that it was necessary to have sufficient ore developed to provide security for such loans. This, except in exceptional cases, is utterly ridiculous. There are few mines with developed and measurable tonnages that cannot secure funds from smelting companies of well financed organizations providing the deposit is commerciably mineable. Moreover few mines develop much tonnage ahead. They assume, and sometimes reasonably so, that the tonnage is there, or that the fissure of bedding is there, but the old saying "you cannot see beyond the miners pick" still holds true and loan agencies will find this out sooner or later at the expense of the taxpayer. If the government wished to do something for the mining industry why not stimulate prospecting with loans to the prospector. Canada tried this method of stimulating mining and as a result is riding back to prosperity on the crest of a gold boom.


The quartz shows mineralization and is the second vein to be cut on the 820 level where work is proceeding in several faces with two shifts working. - Denver Mining Record.
