We are permitted to reprint the following letter written by a Japanese man to his American neighbor as an example of the manner in which the people of Japan are mastering the English language: Dear Sir:

(Continued from Page 1) The first streamline train, three cars, is 204 feet 5 inches in

length. The second train, six cars, is 375 feet 11 inches in length. The 900 horsepower, 12-cylinder, V-type Diesel engine, in the ap-

plication of which to light weight, high-speed passenger equipment the Union Pacific is pioneering, represents the latest development in this character of power designed and built by the Winton Engine Corporation, subsidiary of General Motors.


The engine proper is 20 feet in overall length and weighs 18,000 pounds. It is directly connected to a generator, weighing 11,700 pounds, which provides the electric energy to drive the four traction motors which have a combined weight of 26,400 pounds. The total weight of the entire power plant including engine, generator, motors, auxiliary engine generator set, pumps, radiators, air com

pressors, etc., is approximately 79,000 pounds. The power car itself, with all its machinery and trucks, weighs 80 tons.

The train is completely air-conditioned throughout. Two of the Pullman cars are of the 10-section type and include also in each car a compartment and a bedroom. The third Pullman is of eight sections and has one compartment and one bedroom. The three cars have sleeping accommodations, assigning one passenger to each upper and lower, for 68 passengers. All Pullmans have two extra-long sections for tall persons. The coach buffet has seats for 56 passengers. The buffet kitchen is located in the fin-like tail of the rear car and from this meals are served directly to passengers at their seats in the coach and to those in the Pullman cars.
