Shaping Plans For Elks Meet October 11-12-13

Plans are progressing rapidly for the three day "frolic" which will be staged by the Elks, October 11, 12 and 13. Visitors are expected not only from all Nevada lodges but also from hundreds of California lodges who have promised to attend the state's biggest conclave.

Street dancing, band concerts, and a parade are among the many features which will interest the general public.

Convention headquarters will be at the Elks Club and all visitors will register upon arrival.

The committee on arrangements is working feverishly to make the affair one of the biggest conventions from every standpoint ever held in Clark county. Members of the committee include Eugene Goldstucker, Roy Griffiths, Art Harris, Carl Belding and Tom Enright.

Examinations At High School Sat.

Examinations will be held tomorrow (Saturday) September 29 at the high school by the Nevada State Employment Service and National Employment Service. Hours are 8 to 12 in the morning and 1 to 5 in the afternoon.

Examinations will be as follows: Field Supervisor, age at least 25 years, salary \$1368 to \$1440 a year. Manager, age at least 25 years; salary \$1440 to \$1800 a year. Junior and Senior Interviewers, age at least 21 years.

Statistician, age at least 25 years; salary \$2185 to \$2300 a year.

Statistical Assistant, age at least 21 years.

Clerk, typist, stenographer; age at least 18 years, salary \$960 to \$1080 a year.
