TINTIC PRINCE PUSHING WORK

EUREKA - Development work is progressing satisfactorily at the Tintic Prince property in the North end of the district and the shaft has reached a depth of 110 feet. Two shifts are employed.

It will be remembered that the Tintic Prince first drove a tunnel into the mountain side a little more than four thousand feet in length and cut out a station before sinking operations were started. From the tunnel level a raise was run about thirty-five feet and from there an incline was sent down to the west at an angle of about 45 degrees to the tunnel level, this arrangement permitting the proper angle for the cable on the tunnel level to the cheve wheel at the top of the gallows frame. The station is also large enough to permit the switching of several cars and at the same time give storage space for timbers

and other materials used in sinking

operations.

The property is well equipped. In addition to the air hoist on the twhnel level there is a large compressor and blower fan at the mouth of the tunnel. These are enclosed in well constructed buildings and there is also an office, a work room and a change room for the miners. There is also a residence large enough to accommodate four or five workmen but at the present time only one man, the watchman, remains at the property. Taking everything into consideration the Titanic Prince has made plans for a long and vigorous campaign of development.-Western Mining Survey.
