FIRST SHOWING OF GOLD MADE IN KING MIDAS TUNNEL

MIDAS, Nev. - The first showing of gold in the King Midas tunnel has occurred about 325 feet from the portal. The bore, after entering the rhyolite, ran head on into an east-west cross-fissure. Samples of the quartz, of which three were taken, assayed \$8 to \$10 in gold. The tunnel is being pushed ahead to reach the vein opened from the surface more than 20 years ago. About 40 feet of work will bring the bore directly under the old surface workings which followed the pay streak down 100 feet, at an additional depth of 250 feel. The old vein has a north-south strike. When it is encountered and the mine provided with an air compressor, drifting on the new crossfissure to its intersection with the old vein will be undertaken.

The King Midas, which is one o the oldest locations in the Gold Circle district, was near the scene of a sensational strike in the early days. A prospector named Ham burger uncovered an ore body that yielded several tons of \$1000 ore at grass roots. The present King Midas company has an option on the claim in which this strike was
