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Ceremonial Of Shriners To Be Most Impressive

The most spectacular, impressive and striking ceremonial ever planned by the Knights of the Mystic Shrine will be held at midnight Saturday next, the stage for the great event being in the Black Canyon of the Colorado.

On the upper coffer dam beneath the gigantic bulk of Boulder Dam, sheltered by the thousand-foot walls of the canyon, five thousand Shriners from all over the west will stand at attention while trumpeters sound the call to colors at "Low Twelve." Batteries of searchlights from Hollywood will light the canyon as never before. While the massed bands of the Temples from Los Angeles, Reno and San Diego play "Stars and Stripes Forever," the beams of the searchlights will play on a great banner, Old Glory, waving seven hundred feet above.

William Rhoades Harvey, High Priest and Prophet of Al Malaikah Temple, Los Angeles will deliver the address. The general public will be admitted to Observation Point, but will not be able to see the ceremonial which is for Shriners only.

The Scottish Rite degrees are being conferred Thursday and Friday.

Saturday, October 20, Kerak, Reno, accompanied by its band, will arrive by special train at 9:00 a. m., and will exemplify preliminary degree work at American Legion hall, Boulder City, between 1:00 and 6:00 p. m.

Eight special trains from San Diego, Phoenix and Los Angeles, bringing approximately 3,500 Shriners, will arrive at Boulder City beginning at 9:30 p. m.

Ceremonial on upper coffer dam, 11:15 p. m. to midnight. Supper will be served at Anderson Brothers mess hall, Boulder City at 2:30 a. m. Sunday morning. At 2:30 a. m., a day coach train moves to Las Vegas.

Sunday, 11:00 a. m., Band concert and Shrine Chanters at Administration Building, Boulder City.

Sunday, 1:30 p. m., Parade in Las Vegas; 2:30 p. m., band concert, court house lawn.

Beginning at 9:30 Sunday evening, the special trains will leave for home.

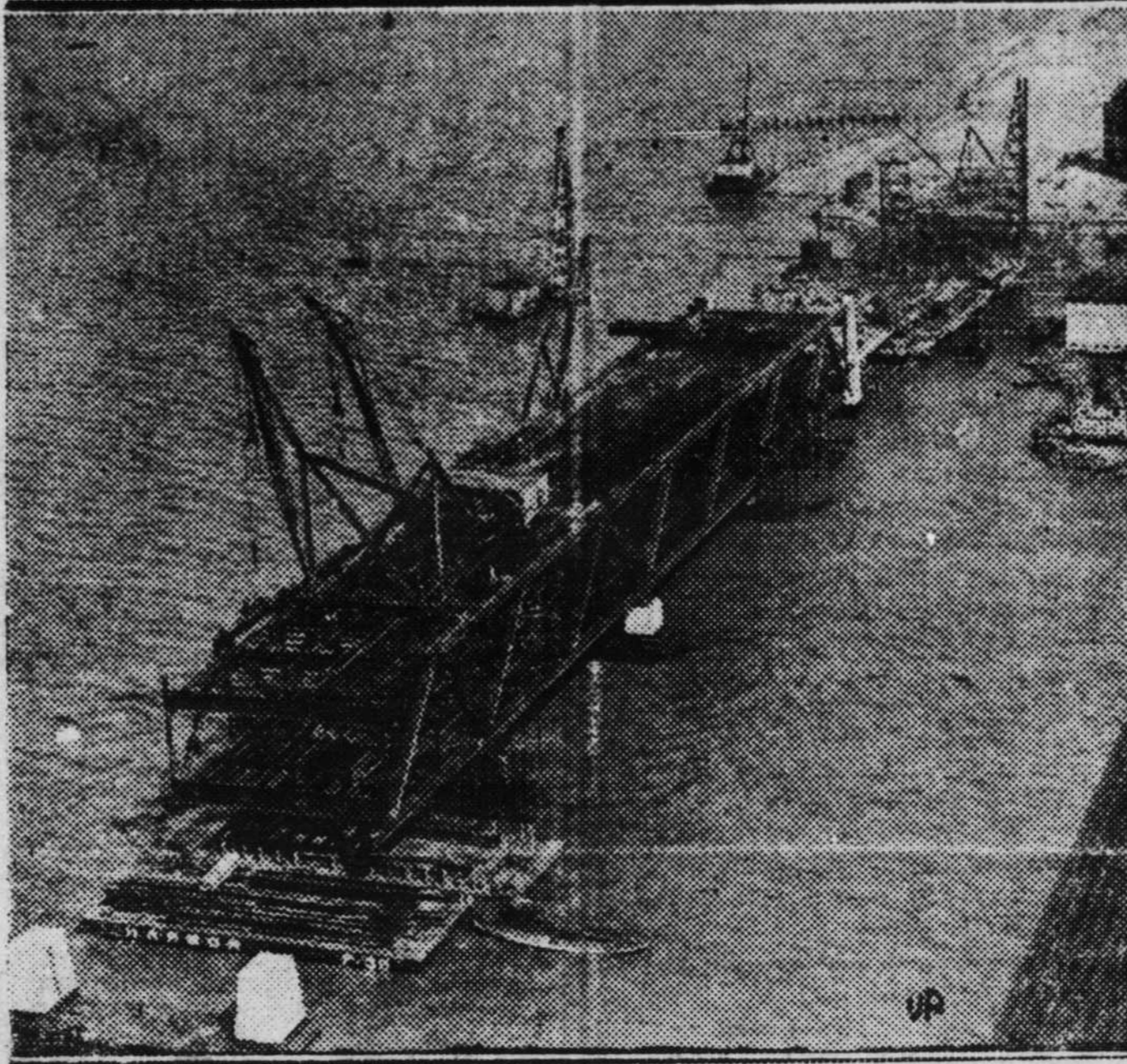
MOVES TO LOS ANGELES

RONSTADT DIES SUDDENLY

John B. Ronstadt died suddenly at Long Beach, Cal., during the night of October 9-10, 1934, of heart failure. He was 63 years of age and leaves surviving him his widow, Claudia Spaulding Ronstadt.

Funeral services were held in Long Beach Friday, October 12, Rev. E. A. Palmer, who knew John for many years when both resided in Las Vegas, officiating.

John Ronstadt was one of those who came to Las Vegas about the time the town lots were sold in May 1905 and resided here until he moved to Long Beach eleven years ago. He married Claudia Spaulding in the summer of 1927, and each year it has been the happy custom of the pair to make a visit to Nevada. In June last year they had three wonderful weeks together camping near Lake Tahoe and visiting Reno. And on September 28 they came to Las Vegas via Needles, Searchlight and the Dam. While here he was taken with an attack of what seemed like indigestion and was able to see but a few of his old friends.

Returning home October first, John was taken with a severe cold which so weakened his heart that he died suddenly during his sleep.

Many of the old-timers of Las Vegas including the Editor of The Age, feel deep sorrow at the passing of their old friend, John B. Ronstadt, and extend their sincere sympathy to his sorrowing widow.
