Mrs. Arentz Rejoins Party Touring State

Mrs. Harriet K. Arentz, candidate for the office of State Treasurer, has again joined the party of Republican candidates touring the state. Her little daughter, Alice, who was so ill as to require the care of her mother, has now nearly recovered and Mrs. Arentz rejoined the other candidates at Elko, leaving Alice in care of her sister.

Mrs. Arentz writes that she is very sorry not to have been in Southern Nevada with the other candidates when they were here recently, but that her daughter's illness made that impossible.

Mrs. Arentz, who is the widow of the late Congressman Samuel S. Arentz, is pressing her campaign for State Treasurer as strongly as is possible under the circumstances as her daughter's illness and limited finances will permit. She is obliged to leave her candidacy largely in the hands of her friends and acquaintances throughout the state, upon whose kindly efforts she relies for victory November sixth.

Pullen, with his usual helpful spirit, invited him into the car then, thinking to give the old fellow an unusual thrill, speeded up to about 75 miles per hour.

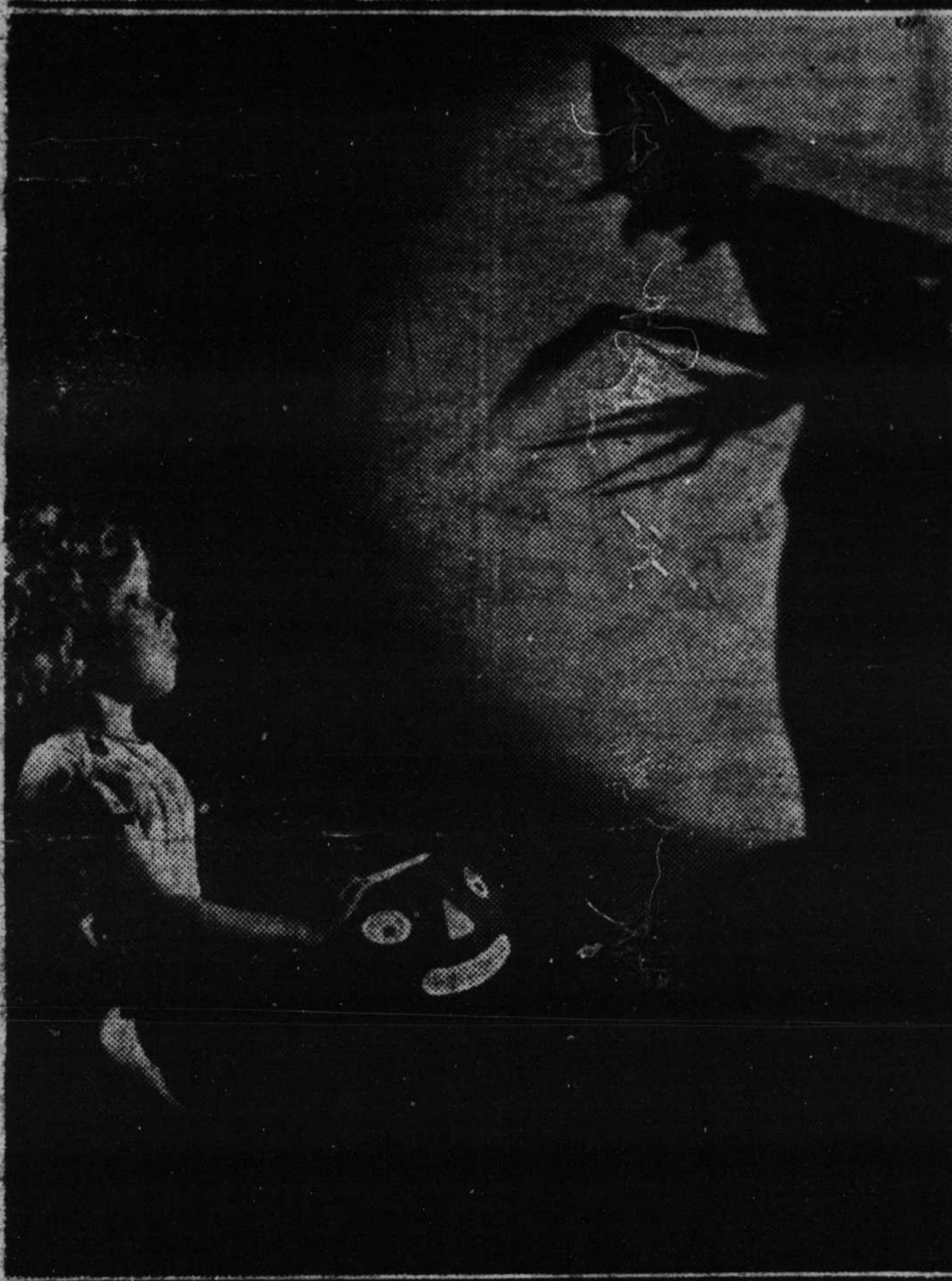
Arriving at the county seat, the old man got out of the car and said: "Say, young feller, how fast were we going back there?"

Open 4-H Club Fair Tomorrow

Griswold Will Address Radio Public Tuesday

RENO—(Special) Nevada voters, who were unable to hear Acting Governor Morley Griswold's Reno address when he opened his campaign early this month, will be given a second opportunity to hear him in a state-wide broadcast.

Special arrangements have been made with KSL, a powerful Salt Lake City radio station, for broadcast Tuesday night, October 30, for Nevada's governor to speak. The broadcast will be presented between 10 o'clock and 11:00 o'clock p. m. (Pacific Standard Time.)

The broadcast is also an answer to pleas from numerous Nevada voters living outside of Reno, who were unable to hear the Governor's previous radio addresses on account of other radio interference with the local Reno station on the night of his address.

Governor Griswold will fly from Reno on Tuesday afternoon, October 30, to Salt Lake City to make the broadcast and return that night to Reno to attend the Nevada Admission day celebration in Reno, October 31.

Another radio address will be given in behalf of Griswold's candidacy on Thursday evening, November 1, from station KNX, Hollywood. Lester D. Summerfield, vice-chairman of the Republican state central committee, will make the address. He will be heard from 9:30 to 10:30 o'clock p. m.

The two broadcasts will be augmented by radio addresses every Monday, Wednesday and Friday over radio station KOH, Reno. Prominent speakers have been booked for the addresses in behalf of Governor Griswold's campaign.

Mines Director Guest of C. of C.

John A. Fulton, director of the Mackey School of Mines at the Nevada State university, was a guest at the meeting of Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce last Tuesday.

He discussed proposed legislation for the coming session of the legislature and asked that the Chamber recommend an appropriation of \$12,500 for the work of the Bureau of Mines, and \$12,500 for cooperative work in completing mineral surveys in various portions of the state.

The matter was placed in the hands of the Committee on Mining and the Committee on Laws and Legislation for report.
