Dillon Guest At Rotary Club Thursday Noon

Dr. C. L. Dillon, whose mother was a Comanche and father a Navajo Indian, was the guest of Dr. Roy W. Martin at the meeting of Las Vegas Rotary club Thursday.

Dr. Dillon was famous as a football player on the Carlisle Indian team, when he originated the "hidden ball" play which resulted in a Carlisle touchdown in their game with Harvard in 1903.

He made a plea that the Indians be given rights and privileges in the government equal to those enjoyed by other individuals of no greater, sometimes much less, education, culture and ability.

Dr. Dillon was arranging for the appearance in Las Vegas next January of an Indian woman reputed the richest of all the Indians, worth twenty-six million dollars in oil properties, who is devoting her life to the attempt to secure for her race the rights to which they are entitled.

Dr. Dillon, who is 73 years of age, appears to be a man of not over 45. His hair is jet black with not a gray streak showing.

The race which once numbered more than three million people, has dwindled to something like 350,000. Soon, under the present system, the race will vanish.

"The only heritage we can leave to the nation is this country of ours—America," said Dr. Dillon in closing his appeal.

Tex Blackman, in charge of the Rotary program for the day, made a talk on Boys' Work as a community service. He has arranged for each member of the Rotary club to be put in touch with ten boys to discuss boys' problems with them and recommend such activities as seem necessary and desirable.
