NEVADA, SMALLEST STATE IN POPULATION HIGH IN LIST IN TAX MONEY PAID GOVT.

Nevada being the smallest state in the union in population, there is an impression that it pays the least revenue to the federal government, and at the same time receives the greatest proportionate benefit through government expenditures. This conclusion is shown to be entirely erroneous.

In a recent published statement, a table was given showing where federal money comes from, and where such money goes. It is based on government receipts and expenditures, giving the figures by states, as well as the source of revenue, and the nature of the disbursement.

E. H. Walker, manager of the Reno chamber of commerce, herewith submits an analysis of the figures which indicate that Nevada is doing her full share in bearing the expenses of the federal government in comparison with other states.

"In studying these figures," Walker says, "it should be kept in mind that Nevada stands lowest in population, or 48th in the list of states."

Walker's analysis showing the payments made to the government by Nevada and the receipts by the state from federal sources is as follows:

Payments to Federal Government
Income tax, \$1,735,364 or 36th. States paying less were Arizona, Arkansas, Idaho, Mississippi, Montana, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont and Wyoming.

NIRA taxes on excess profits, capital stock dividends: \$180,341 or 38th. States paying less were Arizona, Arkansas, Idaho, Mississippi, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Vermont and Wyoming.

Estate taxes: \$18,563 or 47th. Utah paid less.
Gift taxes: None paid by Nevada or the states of Mississippi, New Mexico, South Dakota, Utah or Wyoming.

Internal revenue. Spirits, wines, malt liquor taxes: \$195,528 or 31st. States paying less were Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Delaware, Georgia, Idaho, Kansas, Maine, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Vermont, Virginia and West Virginia.

Tobacco tax: \$234 or 43rd. States paying less were New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma and Vermont.

Narcotics tax, manufacturers excise tax, processing taxes, admissions, club dues, miscellaneous, etc. 48th. Total collected in Nevada, \$218,261.

Stamp taxes: \$31,349 or 37th. States paying less were Arizona, Idaho, Mississippi, Montana, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Carolina, South Dakota, Vermont and Wyoming.

Grand total federal taxes: \$2,375,582 or 40th. States paying less were Arizona, Idaho, Mississippi, North Dakota, South Dakota, New Mexico,

OHIO COMPANY IS COMPLETING MILL AT NEVADA GROUP

GOLDFIELD — The Ohio Mines Company at Goldpoint is completing installation of a 100-ton cyanide plant at its property. Supt. Sidney Harris announced that the work is well under way with the arrival of two 200-horsepower diesel engines that will be connected direct with generators.

The plant is being set up in the company's old mill building and all equipment is to be of the latest type. The company has finished its water shaft located in Lyda Canyon and will have all the water it requires. A pipeline four inches in diameter is being constructed and will have a length of 10 1/2 miles.

The plant is expected to be in operation by Dec. 1 and when in operation will employ three shifts, giving continuous production.

Harris said that 100,000 tons of ore running from \$15 to \$18 a ton has been blocked out. The ore carries gold and silver in the ratio of eight ounces of silver to one of gold. The company plans to continue sinking the main shaft while taking out ore for the mill.

Otto A. Diegmann of Cincinnati, Ohio, secretary of the company, and H. M. Povenmier of Ada, Ohio, a director, who are on the ground, stated Albert Silver, expert metallurgist, has been retained as metallurgical engineer.

Ten to fifteen men are employed at present and others will be added as the property is developed.

AUSTIN, Nev. — A. C. Most, mining engineer, is managing what formerly was known as the Lime Point property in northern Lander county, eight miles south of Tenabo on the south slope of the range facing Cortez. The property will hereafter be known as Goldacres.

Public works administration: \$5,093,944 or 44th with Delaware, New Hampshire, Maine, and Vermont receiving less.

Grand total: \$18,617,530 or 46th. Delaware and New Hampshire receiving less.

The state of Nevada received \$7.82 for every tax dollar paid to the United States government standing 34th in this respect. One state received as high as \$74.98 for each tax dollar paid, or nearly 10 times as much as Nevada.

EMPIRE STAR HAS STARTED SINKING TO 2050-FT. LEVEL

NEVADA CITY, Calif.—At present the Empire Star Mining Company, Ltd., is raising a new vertical shaft from a hanging crosscut on the 1600-foot level of its Murchie mine. This shaft will be raised 100 feet after which the company will sink the new shaft from the 1600 to the 2050 level plus the additional footage necessary for a loading pocket.

Since the Murchie mine was taken over from the American Foundation Company Jan. 1, 1932, the main shaft has been sunk 350 feet plus a 50-foot sump.—Denver Mining Record.

MANHATTAN MINE REPORTS STRIKE

TONOPAHA — Manhattan mining camps were thrown into excitement recently when George Ferrick, superintendent of the Gold Metals Extension property, reported striking an 18-inch vein of \$203 ore. Assays made showed the ore contained 5.80 ounces of gold with a value of \$203 a ton.

The find was made on a drift from the 50 level and Ferrick, sensing what he had run into, worked his men overtime to obtain samples for an assay. — Denver Mining Record.

SEARCHLIGHT — A total of 24 men are employed by the Western Consolidated Gold Mines, Inc., which is planning the installation of a 300-kilowatt diesel power plant. The company is both producing and developing its gold and silver property here.

The shaft is down 320 feet and two 10-stamp mills are operating with a daily tonnage of 40 tons of ore, altho the mill capacity is 50 tons per day. The plant is equipped with cyanidation and amalgamation units. Ore for the mill is supplied by the mine and by custom ore.
