A group of about 65 distinguished engineers of the San Francisco Bay region under the leadership of H.W. Crosier, one of the best known electrical engineers of the Pacific coast, arrived in Las Vegas early last Saturday morning, had breakfast here and were then taken to Boulder City by U. P. motor busses. At the Administration building they were greeted by Walker R. Young, and other officials of the U.S. Reclamation bureau and by officials of Siz Companies Inc., and thence were conducted to the dam and shown over the work.

In the evening they enjoyed a most appetising turkey dinner served by the ladies of Boulder City at the Community church. Guests from Las Vegas were O. A. Kimball, who carried the greetings of the Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce, Frank F. Garside and C. P. Squires.

Dr. Emmet Rixford acted as toustmaster most happily. Among the peakers were Walker R. Young, who recounted some of the most interesting features of construction on the Boulder Canyon project. The employment preference for ex-service men has resulted in the employment of about 47 per cent of ex-pervice men at the beginning, the number declining to about 40 per cent at present. The peak of em? ployment was reached last July when there were 5212 men at work. The number now employed is approximately 4500, Mr. Young said.

New Secretary Chosen Tuesday C. of C. Meeting

Oliver Goerman, commander of the local post of the American Legion, and for several years past active in the community life of Las Vegas, was elected secretary of the Chamber of Commerce at the meeting last Tuesday.

The election was made upon the report of the special committee appointed to recommend a new secretary in place of Nye Wilson, whose resignation goes into effect January first when he enters upon his duties as secretary of the Alhambra, Cal., Chamber of Commerce. The committee, consisting of A. S. Henderson, chairman; James Cashman, Marion Earl, W.E. Ferron and O. W .Yates, after giving careful consideration to each of the seven applicants received and the qualifications of each applicant, were unanimous in recommending that Mr. Goerman be made secretary for the term of three months from January first with the understanding that the term may be extended indefinitely at the option of the Chamber. Mr. Goerman stated that this arrangement is perfectly satisfactory to him and that if he could not prove himself the right man for the place in three months he would prefer to be relieved.

The choice of Mr .Goerman by the committee was ratified both by a vote of the membership and the board of directors.

Secretary Goerman has had long experience in community activities. especially in St. Joseph, Mo., where he resided prior to coming to Las Vegas. He has been active in the affairs of this city since coming here in 1930. He has had the advantage of being closely associated with Nye Wilson, the retiring secretary, and of having thereby obtained a considerable knowledge of the duties of his new office.
