### OFFICIAL NEVADA FLAG IS DESIGNED IN CARSON

Nevada now has an official flag for the commander-in-chief of her military forces, for use on appropriate occasions, says the Carson Appeal.

The flag ordered by the board of capital commissioners and on display in the governor's office, is of the regulation size, three and one-half by four and one-half feet. The body is of solid cobalt blue, with heavy yellow fringe on three sides.

In each corner of the flag is a silver star, in the center of large silver star with the letter 'N' above the upper point and the other letters completing the word 'Nevada' equally spaced between the points of the star. Above the star is a yellow scroll bearing the black Roman-lettered words, "Battle Born."

Beneath the center star are two sprigs of sagebrush in natural colors, crossed, bearing yellow flowers.

The flag is of handwork of high quality, and the same design was put on both sides.—Ely Record.

### SHORTER TRAINS WAY TO INCREASE JOBS, SHAUGHNESSY

Shorter trains will have to be the answer to the railroad employees' prayer for more jobs, John F. Shaughnessy, chairman of the Nevada public service commission, said in a statement addressed to the Intermediate Rate Association, of which he is president.

The answer to the prayer of railroad managements for more business lies in making the rail plant more flexible and more responsive to transportation needs, rather than in continually mounting freight rates, Shaughnessy added.

"I often have told trainmen and enginemen in our state that their relief from unemployment is not to be found in repeal of the long and short haul law," Shaughnessy said. "Even if they brought about repeal of that law and got onto the rails every ton of industrial and commercial traffic that goes through the Panama canal, which is perhaps not in excess of a million and a half tons, they could not expect to secure increased employment over any considerable period of time."

### EXCAVATION OF THE LOST CITY IS CCC PROJECT

Cliff Bailey, superintendent of the Boulder Dam State Park CCC camp, located at Overton, Nev., was here last week over Thanksgiving holidays. He was accompanied by Mrs. Bailey.

This camp was established at Overton on October 1, and consists of 210 boys from Ohio and Kentucky.

One camp project this winter consists of excavation of the Lost City to secure relics more than 2,000 years old. These will be placed in a museum to be built at Overton at a cost of more than \$3,000.

Another project is the construction of 12 miles of road in the Valley of Fire, which in the future will skirt Boulder Lake, after the water is impounded behind the big dam.

Bailey was formerly foreman of the forest service CCC camp at Panaca, under Col. T. W. Miller, and was recently promoted to the superintendency of the Overton camp.
