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"Bob" Russell "Broadcasts" at C. of C. Meeting

"Bob" Russell, assisted by Harvey Luce, who provided the speaking equipment, put on a suggested radio program on Las Vegas and Boulder Dam, to show what might be done in that direction. The skit was amusing and Bob's own addition to the broadcast in the role of announcer provided fifteen minutes of good entertainment for the Chamber of Commerce at its meeting Tuesday noon.

A short discussion followed the report of A. S. Henderson, committee chairman, in which he stated that the committee was unable to suggest a form of amendment to the present law because of a wide diversity of opinion among the members as to what should be done. Senator Henderson called attention to the fact that in the last legislature he proposed a bill fixing a "ton-mile scale" as the proper method of charging truckmen using the public highways.

The Venetian Ballroom was elected to membership upon the favorable report of the membership committee.

A motion asking that Las Vegas be given one member of the State Barber's Health and Sanitation Board, was passed after a short discussion.

The matter of proposing legislation for handling Nevada power from Boulder Dam was referred to the committee on laws and legislation. In bringing the matter before the Chamber, Senator Henderson said that there is already a law on the statute books on this subject, but that it might be found, possibly, cumbersome.

James Cashman suggested that advantage be taken of the present opportunity to get money to improve county side roads to encourage and assist mining and other enterprises in various parts of the county.

Bob Russell paid a well deserved tribute to the "Wildcats," Las Vegas football team, which for the fourth time in succession has brought the state championship to Las Vegas. The Chamber heartily applauded.

Nash Speaker At Rotary Club

Percy Nash was introduced by K. O. Knudson, chairman of the program committee at the meeting of Las Vegas Rotary Club Thursday, to carry out the program of the day.

The result was a most interesting, although all too brief, account of experiences in Alaska, 1897 to 1906, when he was miner, trapper, hunter, trader and explorer on the Stewart river, a tributary of the Yukon far above the Klondike. His stay in the far north was of four years duration the first time and two years later after a stay of comparatively short duration in the United States.

Mr. Nash illustrated his narrative with maps, a great collection of photographs which he took himself, and a collection of most interesting mementos of Indian handiwork which he secured in the north.

During his stay in the far north, Mr. Nash had some trying experiences, not the least serious of which was on occasion when he lay alone for about a week in the wilds with a leg shattered by a blow of an ax, to be finally rescued by the only human being in that part of the country, who happened to observe the smoke of the fire the injured

Plan Community Xmas Program For 20th Time

Again this year for the twentieth consecutive time, Las Vegas will bring cheer to the unfortunate and happiness to hundreds of little folks by carrying out plans for the community Christmas celebration.

This year, more than ever before, those who have a fair share of the necessities of life must divide with those who have not. With the very serious unemployment and destitution prevailing, there must be larger contributions by all civic and fraternal bodies and by individuals than were received by the committee last year.

Representatives of nearly all lodges, service clubs, churches, unions and other organizations met Tuesday evening at the Chamber of Commerce to make plans for the coming Christmas.

K. O. Knudson, who has so ably carried the leadership of the Community Christmas Committee for several years, was unanimously chosen to head the committee again this year. Mrs. Charles Dimock was reelected secretary.

The public exercises, set for 5:30 p.m., December 24, will be held at the court house grounds where a stately pine, to be contributed through the efforts of Claud Mackey, head of the Federal transient relief camp, the Forest Service and the American Legion, will be the center of attraction. Of course the tree will be elaborately lighted and decorated and there will be a small gift of Christmas goodies for each of more than 2500 children.

The bulk of the money collected will be used for the purpose of providing each of the many destitute families of Las Vegas with a basket containing the things necessary for a real, filling Christmas dinner with the trimmings and accessories which belong to Christmas.

Finance—C. S. Wengert, chairman and treasurer, with Mrs. Leo A. McNamee, Allye Lawson, Harold Case and Bert Spencer to act as an aggressive body for collection of the funds.
