Jeanne Elizabeth Wier gave her life for nearly thirty years to the invaluable work of the Nevada State Historical Society in preserving the state's historic records and relics and putting into print for the use of posterity a vast amount of the information secured by word of mouth from the little surviving group of the state's early pioneers.

No state produced more heroic figures as a background for its traditions than did Nevada and it is certain that no state had its beginnings so full of romance and tragedy as Nevada.

For some reason, probably because of lack of knowledge and appreciation by state legislators of the value of the work of the Nevada State Historical Society, the services of Miss Wier were poorly paid and often the materials which she had secured with such painstaking labor were kicked about from place to place.

The Lions Club of Reno is sponsoring a movement to induce the state to provide more adequately for the Society. It is a laudable and unselfish enterprise and should have the backing of the people and the support of the legislature.

NEW BOUNTY LAW

SOON IN EFFECT

The new law for the payment of bounties for the destruction of coyotes, bob-cats and mountain lions which was adopted by a referendum vote at the last general election went into effect on Tuesday, December 18, after the official canvassing of the vote by the justices of the supreme court Monday.

The county clerks who will have the duty of administering the law require considerable equipment in the way of forms, machines for perforating skins on which the bounty has been paid, etc. Up to this writing County Clerk Lena E. Streshley has not yet received the equipment which she will need for carrying out the provisions of the act.
