ORDINANCE No. 214

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE MAKING, CARRYING, KEEPING AND SELLING OF CERTAIN WEAPONS AND DEVICES.

The Board of Commissioners of the City of Las Vegas do ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to make, sell or expose for sale, or cause or permit to be made, sold or exposed for sale, or to have possession of or keep, any blackjack, sandjack, billy, slung-shot, sling bat, or other similar weapon or device made of metal, leather, wood, or rubber, or any cross knuckles or or nuckles, made of any kind of metal, or any weapon or device which is or may be used only in the commission of an unlawful act; provided, however, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to any police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, constable, or deputy constable.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of every police officer to seize every weapon or device mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance, found in the City of Las Vegas, except such as are in possession of person authorized by the said Section 1 to have possession thereof, and to deliver the same at once to the Chief of Police. The Chief of Police shall hold such weapon or device to be used as evidence against any person, firm or corporation against whom any proceeding is pending in any Court, if the same is needed as evidence in such proceeding. If the same is not needed as evidence in any such proceeding, or if the same is needed then after final judgment shall be rendered in such proceeding, the Chief of Police shall fix a time and a place where such weapon or device will be destroyed, and on such date and at such place the Chief of Police shall publicly destroy such weapon or device. Any number of such weapons or other devices may be destroyed at the same time and place. The Chief or Police, before destroying such weapon or device, shall keep a record describing such weapon or device, the time when and place where the same was seized, and the name of the person, firm or corporation in whose possession or under whose control the same was found.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, except a peace officer, to wear or in any manner carry, concealed upon his person, any dirk, bowie knife, sword cane, loaded or unloaded gun, loaded or unloaded pistol, loaded or unloaded revolver or any other dangerous or deadly weapon, without having at the same time actually in his possession and upon his person an unexpired permit so to do, issued by the Police and Fire Commissioner of the City of Las Vegas authorizing him to carry such weapon concealed.

Section 4. The Police and Fire Commissioner shall have power to issue to any person, who, in his judgment, shall have such privilege, and to whom a permit has been granted by the County Commissioners of Clark County, Nevada, a permit in writing to carry concealed any of the weapons specified in Section 3 of this ordinance. Such permits shall be numbered consecutively in the order in which they are issued. No permit shall be granted for a longer period than twelve (12) months. Such permit shall state the name, address and occupation of the person to whom the same is issued, and the date of its expiration, and shall specify the kind and description and number if any, of the weapon authorized to be carried concealed by such person. A duplicate copy of each permit shall be given by the Police and Fire Commissioner to the Chief of Police of said City of Las Vegas. No permit shall be issued by the Police and Fire Commissioner authorizing any person to carry, keep, or have possession of any device or weapon mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance.

Section 5. The Chief of Police shall keep a record of all permits authorized by the Police and Fire Commissioner. No such permit shall be issued to any person until such person shall have paid to the Police and Fire Commissioner a registration fee of One Dollar (\$1.00), which said fee the Police and Fire Commissioner shall pay to the City Clerk on the first Monday of each month following the receipt thereof.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation in the City of Las Vegas, to sell, give away, or loan any weapon mentioned in Section 3 of this ordinance to any person, not having obtained the permit mentioned in Section 4 of this ordinance.

Section 7. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period of not exceeding fifty (50) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 8. Any weapon mentioned in Section 3 of this ordinance found concealed upon the person of another contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be confiscated on order of the Municipal Judge.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its publication and passage.

Section 10. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to have this ordinance published in the Las Vegas Age, a weekly newspaper published in the City of Las Vegas, once a week for a period of two weeks.

Demand Cleanness In Soda Fountains

Visible Signs of Cleanliness Indicate Good Management

When you eat at a restaurant, do you watch for the telltale signs that indicate whether or not the place is run with your health in mind? It is a good habit to form, for the vigilance of customers can be of great assistance to health officers in maintaining the sanitation of public eating places.

Clean dishes, spotless tablecloths or table tops, shining glassware and silver are, of course, indications that care is being taken and also that the management takes pride in cleanliness and observes it in handling food. A clean establishment has clean, tidy waiters. It has clean walls and ceiling and clean floors and counters. I have greater confidence in a restaurant with a sign like this: "Out patrons are invited to inspect our kitchen at all times."

Soda Fountains, Too

Do you look for indications of cleanliness at soda fountains? There is great opportunity for diseases to be spread at such places. Fountain clerks are sometimes careless about washing dishes and glasses, especially in the rush hours when many persons are lined up for something to eat and drink. The utensils are likely to be merely rinsed in lukewarm water, which itself is contaminated by previous washings. Such conditions are obviously unsafe, for infection may be passed along from one customer to others who follow him in the use of fork, spoon and drinking glass.

Since you cannot supervise the cleaning of the glass, fork and spoon you are to put in your mouth, your protection must come from patronizing those places where hot water and soap are used effectively or where single service paper cups and other utensils are used.

Competition is keen. Your patronage will encourage either the careful or the careless proprietor, depending on which one receives your trade. Which will it be?
