Home-made candy is to be one of the features of the holiday season this year, according to the trade observances who keep their ears to the ground for months before Christmas and New Years.

Whether it is the aftermath of several depression years that has brought back home-made candy to its new popularity, or whether it is all just the swing of a cycle, it not particularly important to the average home-maker. The fact remains, that home-made candy is quite the fashion this year, and more of it will be made in American kitchens than ever before in the history of the country.

As to the kinds of candy that are to feature this new vogue, it may be safely predicted that many of the old favorites will retain their popularity. But there will also be novelties, based on new recipes, in which the new scientific kitchen will play its part, with the exactitude of cooking thermometers and oven-regulators and electric refrigeration playing a big part in the resultant product. Nell B. Nichols, famous cooking editor of the Women's Home Companion, supplies a list of the "best sellers" among the new candy recipes. Here are the first ten of her recommendations.

**Bitter Sweet Fudge:** Melt 3-4 pound dripping chocolate in double boiler. Remove from stove, add 1 can sweetened condensed milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup coarsely chopped California wal-

nuts. Chill overnight in buttered pan.

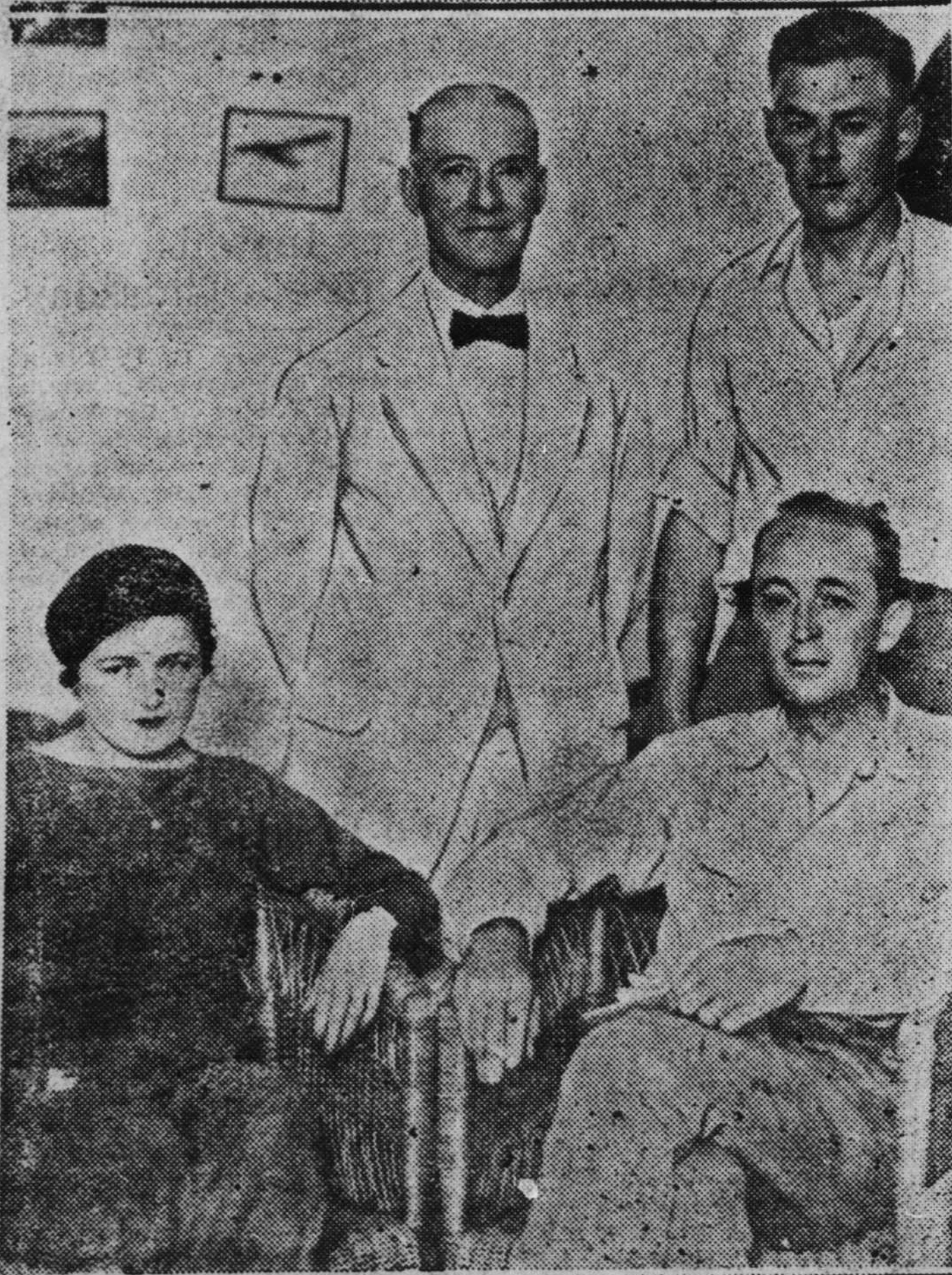
**Orange Taffy:** Cook 2 cups sugar, hard-ball stage. Pour on buttered 1/4 cup water, juice of 2 oranges to plate. When cool enough to handle, pull with tips of fingers. Stretch into long rope without twisting. Break in pieces with knife when cold.

**Spiced Brazil Nuts:** Roast nuts, rub off skins; while hot stir in a little butter. Place in flat pan sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon, also if desired, a powdering of cloves and nutmeg; stir well return to oven stirring often for 5 to 7 minutes. Serve hot or cold.
