## NEVADA MINING COMPANY GIVEN FEDERAL PERMIT

The Amador Mother Lode Mining company, a Nevada corporation with properties in both California and Nevada, has complied with the strict regulations of the federal securities and exchange commission.

O. E. Chaney, president of the mining company, recently received the following telegram from E. R. Hagenah, Washington representative of the Gold Producers Association of America:

"Congratulation. Your statement effective yesterday and official notification in mail."

This means that the mining corporation can do business throughout the United States and can hasten the development of its properties. The company's principal holdings consist of 17 pieces of property county, covering 4000 feet on the Mother Lode in Amador county, covering 4000 feet on the lode. E. A. Stent, managing director of the Argonaut mine, is managing director of the Amador Mother Lode. Development work, which has been under way continuously since June 1, has opened a 10-foot vein at various places in the 380-foot level which runs as high as \$14 a ton and averages about \$9 at the present price of gold.

### EMPLOY MORE MEN

RENO — Approximately 3500 men are actively engaged in mining in Nevada and the industry is being revived by leaps and bounds, it was reported here by H. M. Rives, secretary of the Nevada Mine Operators Association.

Increased prices for gold and silver and hoped-for advances in prices for base metals were advanced by Rives for the improvement.

The State of Nevada has produced over \$1,500,000,000 in mineral wealth and in the opinion of many competent engineers it will produce millions more in addition to ore now in sight in its mines.

## DENVER ENGINEER PLANS FLOTATION FOR MINES

RENO — Sampling of old ore dumps and tailings at Mineral Hill in Eureka county, about midway between Palisade and Eureka, is said to encourage the belief that remaining metals can be recovered by the flotation process with good profit.

C. P. Hughes, a Denver engineer, is said to have conducted extensive sampling for clients and it was indicated that with the success of further tests a flotation mill might be installed in the spring.

## TUNGSTEN MINE OF BOULDER COMPANY HAS ORE RESERVES

LOVELOCK — With winter fast approaching, forecasting an early shutdown of the mine until next spring, the Nightingale property of the Tungsten Production company of Boulder, Colo., has been put in excellent condition for future operations, according to J. B. Maxwell, manager.

The stopes and bins are now full of between 2000 and 3000 tons of ore with additional ore development for future mining, he says.

The ore bodies of the company consist of large garnet veins. The one occupying attention at present is 20 feet wide and contains 1 per cent ore. One the Star clays of the

company, located east and across the flat from the main workings, considerable development has been done on a 60-foot vein. From this, during the summer, a 200-ton mill run was made which proved the ore to be of about the same grade as near the mill.

A splendid thing about the Nightingale property is that slips and faults disappear with depth, a strong vein being found at the 140-foot depth to which the shaft has been sunk. Bearing on the substantiality of the deposit is the fact that the country is knit together with a huge lime deposit thousands of feet in width. The mines are practically in virgin country.

## GERMAN BAR GOLD IS ERECTING MILL AT NEVADA GROUP

RENO — Practically all materials have been taken to the German Bar Gold mines in northern Nevada country for the winter. Rapid progress is being made on the erection of the new mill. The management expects to place it in operation early in January. It is of the ball type with a daily capacity of 35 tons. Installation of a large compressor and pumps was completed recently.

There are several tunnels, winzes and considerable lateral development on the property. Sufficient ore is available for an extended period of production. The property is operated by the German Bar Gold Mines, Ins., with Thomas Stephens in charge.

## MINERS GOLD HAS MADE DISCOVERY IN NEVADA

MIDAS, Nev. — This camp is excited over the opening in the King Midas group at 350-foot depth of the vein developed at the surface a quarter of a century ago. The vein was entered at 400 feet in the King Midas tunnel, directly under the old workings. The walls have not yet been encountered.

In the early shaft, values averaged around \$8 a ton in gold, and at the new price the same ore would

be worth about \$13 a ton. Treatment facilities will be improved by a flotation plant to be erected by the Miners Gold Company which controls the King Midas.

## NEVADA MAKING HUGE GAINS IN RECOVERY FIGHT

CARSON CITY — Another business barometer today showed Nevada to be pulling spectacularly out of Depression's red ink.

That measure of business recovery was supplied by a Travelers Insurance company survey of the automobile trades as they are indicated by new car registrations and gasoline consumption.

Nevada, it was shown, was third in the list of 48 states in the number of increased registrations. This state increased 18.20 per cent. Mo-

tor fuel demands kept pace with increased registration.

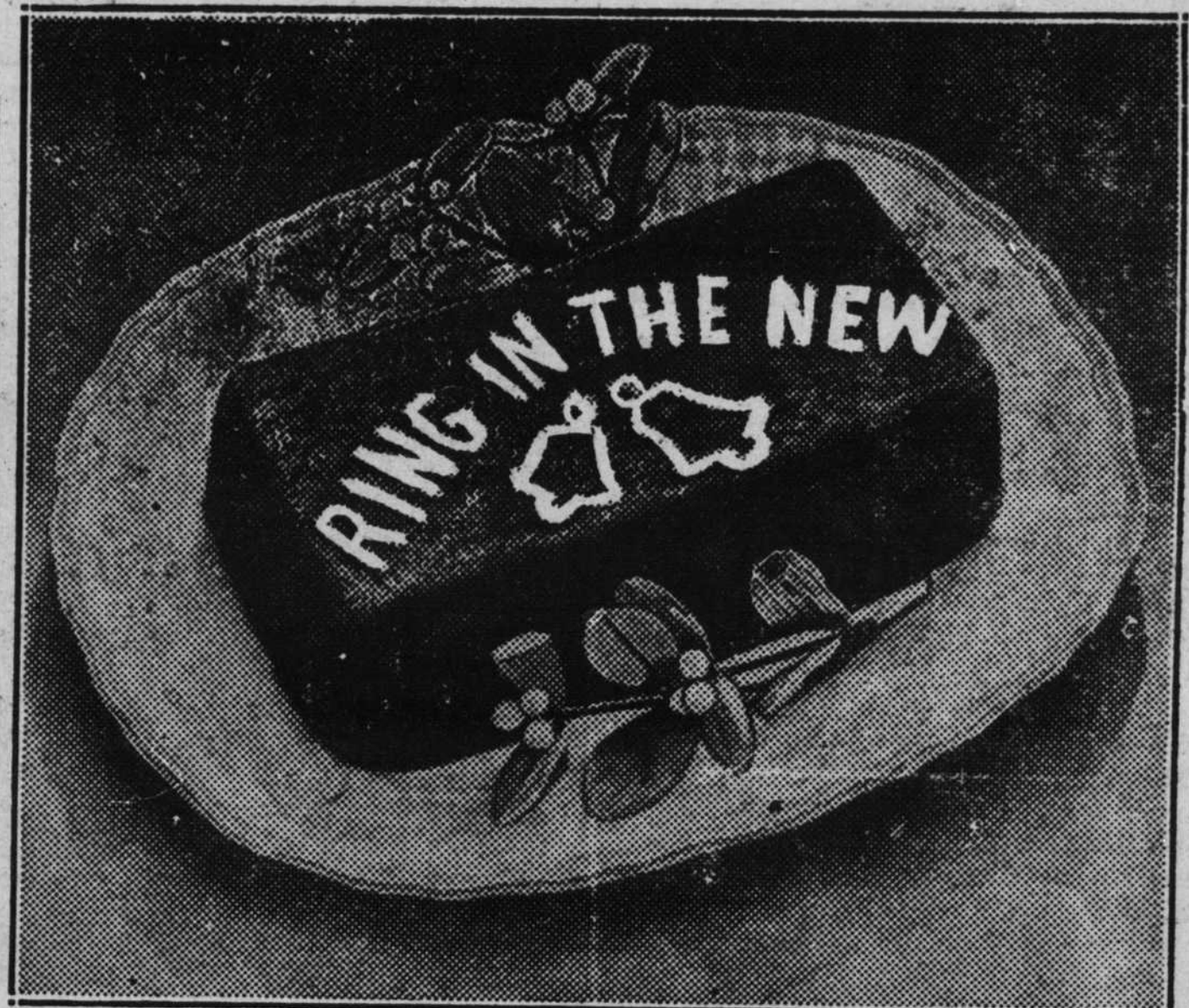
## CATTLEMEN HEAR CARPENTER

General discussion of the act was participated in by those attending the meeting during the afternoon. The conference was held under the auspices of the newly organized Nevada State Cattlemen's Association.

## Hail the Glad New Year With a Lucky Mince Meat Spice Cake



Celebrate the glad New Year with this lucky fruit cake; it's easy and economical to make with a package of dry mince meat.

WHETHER you hail 1935 with a jovial midnight supper or a New Year's afternoon open house, a lucky fruit cake is the proper accompaniment to your toast to good fortune in the days that come. Here is an easy recipe that is as economical as it is delicious. (You write predictions on bits of paper and thrust them into the under side of the cake after it is baked, so that one will come in each slice.)

### Good Fortune Fruit Loaf

- 1/2 (10 oz.) package dry mince meat and 1/4 cup water boiled almost dry
- 1/2 cup butter or other shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1-3/4 cups flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk

Break mince meat into pieces. Add cold water. Place over heat and stir until all lumps are thoroughly broken up. Bring to brisk boil; continue boiling for three minutes, or until mixture is practically dry. Allow to cool. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, one at a time, and beat vigorously until smooth and creamy.

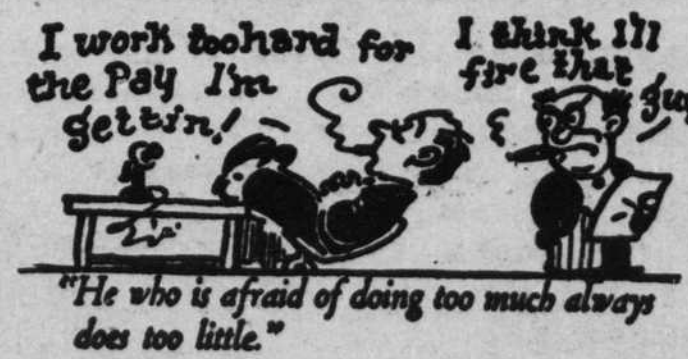
Add cooled mince meat. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, spices and salt, and sift again. Add alternately with milk to first mixture. Pour into greased square cake pan (8 inch). Bake about 40 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.).

### Cherry Brandy Ice Cream

- 2/3 cup sweetened condensed milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 16 large maraschino cherries, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon brandy or brandy extract
- 1 cup whipping cream

Blend sweetened condensed milk and water thoroughly. Add maraschino cherries which have been finely chopped, and brandy or brandy extract. Chill. Whip cream to custard-like consistency and fold into chilled mixture. Pour into freezing pan. Place in freezing unit. After mixture has frozen to a stiff mush (one to two hours) remove from refrigerator. Scrape mixture from sides and bottom of pan. Beat two minutes. Smooth out and replace in freezing unit for one hour or until frozen for serving. (Two to five hours, total freezing time.) Serves six.
