## RED AND GREEN

How to add the dash of cheery red and friendly green to menus during the Holiday season is the subject of pondering now, for most of us are confronted by a season of unusual hospitality. Christmas greeting cards have brought old friends to our sides. There's joy enough in just the Holiday entertaining, apart from gifts and tree.

Perhaps the most complete, all-over pattern for adding character to the table is to use one of the smart cellophane tablecloths in one of the gay colors you plan to use. A gay red cellophane spread provides a lovely contrast to silver and white china. If you're using pure, frosty silver for decorations, transparent cellophane over a white luncheon cloth will give the highlights you want. Then for a centerpiece, pile up the shimmering silver balls used for Christmas tree decorations on a table mirror.

To make stars twinkle and poinsettias bloom in the refreshments you serve is a delightful assignment. Think of all the red and green members of the food kingdom we have to work with. There's red candied cherries, pimentos, red sugar, cranberry juice, tomato aspic, cinnamon candies, red vegetable coloring, beets, even paprika! And among the greens, candied cherries again, and green sugar crystals, mint jelly, green pepper, angelica and pistachio nuts.

Ever turn a pimento into a poinsettia with a kitchen scissors? Try it for the Poinsettia Sandwich Loaf described below. This makes a stunning decoration at the buffet meal or midnight lunch, outlined against the sparkling white of the cream cheese frosting.

There are several interesting salads featuring red and green. One is the tomato jelly ring, filled with a seafood mixture such as flaked crabmeat, and garnished with green pepper rings. Or the ring may be moulded in mint jelly and Waldorf salad flecked with red cranberries used for the center. Individual tomato aspic rings may be filled with diced vegetables in which green peas predominate. Beet juice colors as well as flavors the delicious lemon-gelatine salad using minced onion, horseradish, diced beets and cucumbers, salt and vinegar. Beets chopped fine, sauteed in butter and sprinkled with minced parsley are popular on the holiday dinner table by virtue of their red. Don't forget chopped pimentos in cream-sauce, cranberry juice in fruit cups and cocktails, green and red sugar on the teatime cookies, and cherry mousse and mint sherbet combined for dessert.

**POINSETTIA SANDWICH LOAF**  
Cut crusts from loaf of pullman

bread. Cut one slice  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch thick lengthwise from loaf. Now make an oblong well in loaf leaving  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch of bread on sides and bottom. Fill well with following:

$\frac{1}{2}$  pound ground ham.  
3 chopped hard cooked eggs.  
1-3 cup chopped olives.  
Moisten with mayonnaise.

Put slice back on top of loaf and frost with Philadelphia cream cheese. Make poinsettia from a red pimento, cutting petals toward the center in about quarter-inch strips. Arrange at end of loaf, using sieved egg-yolk for center of flower. Make stem and leaves of green pepper. Chill in refrigerator. This loaf is better for twenty-four hours in the refrigerator covered with a damp cloth and waxed paper. Slice one-half inch thick for serving. Serves 16.

## CRANBERRY PIE

2 cups water.  
2 cups sugar.  
1 quart cranberries.

Boil sugar and water together for 10 minutes, then add cranberries. Cover and cook for about 5 minutes; then remove cover and cook until clear, but not too broken. If desired, a little grated orange peel or cinnamon may be added with the cranberries. Then turn into a pastry-lined pie pan and bake at 425 degrees F. for about 10 minutes, then finish at 350 degrees F. When baked, decorate the pie with cream cheese tinted green, moistened with cream, and forced through pastry tube or bag. Serves 6.

## CRANBERRY PASTRY SLICES

**Pie Crust:**  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup chopped seeded raisins.  
4 cups chopped cranberries.  
Roll pie crust into oblong sheet  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch thick. Mix ingredients; spread over the pastry; roll as for jelly rolls and fasten the ends securely. Place in a greased baking pan and bake in slow oven 45 minutes. Cool. Remove from pan by cutting in 2 inch slices, dust with powdered sugar. Serves about 8.

#### IN MIDAS LEASE

MIDAS, Nev. — Fifty dollars a day at grass roots is the yield credited to the Finkle & Anthony lease on the St. Anthony group in the Gold Circle district. The two men are breaking ore from an eight-inch streak running southeast into the Little Dot claim of the East Standard company. Their shaft is down only 12 feet and the ore is richest at the bottom. The strike was made only about 30 feet from the Little Dot line.
