

Love Triangle Ends Man Hunt

GILROY, Calif. — Jack Bennett, 55 years old, was found dead shot through the head with the same rifle that killed Mrs. Grace Ayres, Austin Martin, and wounded Hazel Ayres, three, during a shooting spree in downtown Watsonville over a love triangle.

Bennett's suicide ended one of the most extensive man hunts in this section in years.

The "friend" returned and helped himself to Ducey's suit while Ducey and Beckstead were at the local theatre. Following their return to their apartment, the theft was discovered and the officers were called. Police were seeking the "friend."

Willig Found Ore Worth \$50 a Ton

WINNEMUCCA—Sam Willig, who is leasing on the Prout and Case property at Barrett Springs, reports that he is developing a valuable block of ore in the property and values are increasing daily. The ore is in both gold and silver and is worth approximately \$50 a ton.

The vein, which averaged one and one-half feet in width previously, is at present three feet wide at the bottom of the shaft at the 180 foot level. Willig has shipped one carload of ore to Utah and will ship the second carload this week.

Hauptmann's Taxes Paid

ALBANY — Income taxes owed by Bruno Richard Hauptmann have been paid to the federal government. An attorney for Mrs. Hauptmann, wife of the man who was electrocuted for the Lindbergh crime, came to Albany to settle Hauptmann's back income taxes.

The attorney handed to Harry M. Hickey, collector of internal revenue for the 14th district, a check for \$1,847.26.

He has been a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen for eighteen years, is legislative representative of the local lodge and secretary of the Nevada State Board. He is a member of the Masonic, Odd Fellows and Eagles fraternities.

He pledges himself, if elected, for municipally-owned power and water plants; retention of the primary law; old age pensions; protection of the rights of labor; necessary school legislation; continued highway improvement and no new taxes.

He seemed the more clever boxer and landed many stinging blows. However, in the third round Paul rallied but most of his swings failed to land. At one point in the round, following a rally by Styger, Martin dropped to his knees, but seemed unhurt.

During the fourth round, it appearing that Styger was receiving a lot of severe punishment, his seconds ended the contest by tossing in the proverbial sponge, proclaiming Martin the victor.

Fred Emhoff of Boulder City put the KO on Hank Johnson of Las Vegas, in the second round of the programmed four-round fight, after sending his opponent to the mat repeatedly.

Ted Ryan fought Al Langley four rounds to a draw. Rollie Morgan put his little opponent out in the first round.

The crowd was large and voted unanimously that this was one of the best fight cards ever put on at Legion Stadium.
