Prosperity For Eastern Nevada In Dam Power

C. P. Squires, publisher of the Las Vegas Age, for many years closely identified with activities leading to the construction of Boulder dam, and having been a member of the first Colorado River Commission, sees a great future for eastern and southern Nevada by reason of extensive development resulting from the cheap power by Boulder dam. In an interview with a representative of the Times, Mr. Squires said:

"I observe a very substantial improvement in business activity in Ely, a natural result of the higher prices for copper and other metals growing out of general improvement in the business of the country.

"The same condition of increased activity and improved business applies to Pioche, Caliente, Las Vegas and the entire area of eastern and southern Nevada, which are now bound together in ties of common interest by the prospect of cheap electric power from Boulder dam.

"Already the great mineral area about Pioche is humming with activity in anticipation of power The main transmission line from Boulder dam to Pioche is under construction and the mining companies of the district have prepared extensive programs of development in the way of mills and concentrating plants, extensions of underground workings and means of transportation. Pioche enjoys a larger payroll and more business activity than at any time for many years and the developments there are only just beginning.

"Las Vegas and Boulder City also nothwithstanding the reduction of employment following completion of Boulder dam, are enjoying much activity and prosperity. Approximately half a million tourists a year are visiting the Las Vegas-Boulder dam Lake Mead region and the number is rapidly increasing. That area offers a list of amazing tourist attractions as yet but little known which, with the improvement of roads and development by the U.S. National Park service, will soon be recognized as the most important playground of the southwest.

"The vast amount of Boulder dam power which will be available for use within the borders of the state is the basis on which the whole region of eastern and southern Nevada may build a new and greater permanent wealth and prosperity than any the state has ever known.

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
