## General Mining News In Brief

### MILL TO BE BUILT

A mill to handle silver, lead, copper and gold ore is to be built at Hiko, Nevada, to handle ore from

the Rosey mine at the Irish Mountain in the Pahranaget district, near Hiko. Rosario Arcuri of Hiko owns and operates this property, which comprises 21 claims, and has been developing it since 1918. Fred Drummond of Las Vegas will direct mill construction.

### CON. VIRGINIA REPORTS

#### NOVEMBER EARNINGS

The following report covering production of the Con. Virginia Mining Company for the month of November has been received by the San Francisco Exchange from President Zeb Kendall:

"During the month of November, consisting of 25 mill running days, the Con. Chollar milled for our company 9745 tons of ore with a gross mill heads value of \$48,755.90, which

netted the Con. Virginia Mining Company \$14,642.22. The average value for the entire tonnage was \$5.003."

### INSTALLING EQUIPMENT

New equipment is being installed by the Weepah-Nevada Mining Company, J. C. Perkins, Tonopah, Nevada, superintendent, where a cyanide addition to the present 250-ton flotation plant is under construction. Southwestern Engineering Company, which built the flotation mill, has the contract for the new plant, with C. W. Strine of Long Beach, California, in charge. About 20 men are employed on the project, completion of which is expected in January. The regular operating crew consists of about 45 men.
