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## Clark Talks On Power Question

Ed W. Clark appeared at the meeting of Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce at invitation of President Harvey Luce, Tuesday last for the purpose of discussing the present complications in the way of securing large blocks of power from Boulder Dam for industrial purposes in Nevada and, incidentally, to discuss the matter of power for local use.

Mr. Clark, a member of the Nevada Colorado River Commission, declared that, because of the complex technicalities of the contract between the government and the Los Angeles bureau of water and power, into which is written the right of Arizona and Nevada to withdraw for use within their respective states 18 percent each of the power to be generated at the dam and which provides that blocks of power in excess of five thousand horse power can be withdrawn only upon two years notice and be relinquished only upon two years notice, the Commission has taken up the question of asking the bureau of reclamation to build one or more generating units for the sole use of Arizona and Nevada.

By this means, Mr. Clark stated, the problem of power for industrial and mining purposes in Nevada will be satisfactorily solved and at the same time relieve both the Los Angeles bureau of water and power and the states of Arizona and Nevada of the present indirect and complicated process involved in the withdrawal of power from the \$22,000,000 power transmission line, which was built for a high voltage transmission and the efficiency of which would be reduced by the withdrawal of power from time to time.

Mr. Clark further stated that the Los Angeles officials are showing a sympathetic attitude toward the needs of Nevada and are giving their influence toward securing a separate and independent generating unit at the dam for the use of Nevada.

Mr. Clark stated that the matter of power for the Lincoln County Power District for use of the mines at Pioche and for general use in that area, has already been arranged for.

Referring to the local situation and the unforeseen delay in securing power for the Southern Nevada Power Company of which he is the
