

## Policeman May Go To School

A. D. Horn, special agent of the U. S. Department of Justice (commonly called G-Men) was a guest at the meeting of Las Vegas Rotary Club Thursday last.

"The G-Men are ready to go anywhere on any mission at a moment's notice," Mr. Horn stated, and related how he was called by phone the other evening at 6:10 and ordered to catch a plane at 7:00 and fly to Denver to assist in the capture of a notorious gang of criminals. He managed to catch the plane and got to Denver through driving snow storms in time to help round up the gang.

Mr. Horn's mission in Las Vegas is to get the city to send a member of the police department to Washington to attend the Police Training School established by the government, to which two officers from Nevada are invited.

Those who attend are given an intensive course of training by the government without cost. It is customary for the officer sent to have his pay continued during his absence. One man has been selected from Reno and the department has decided to select the other from Las Vegas, Mr. Horn states. The matter has been presented to the mayor and board of city commissioners and it is probable the Chief of Police, Dave Mackey, will be chosen to attend the school which begins its next 12-weeks course May 3.

## Champion May Come To Vegas

In the matter of excitement the wrestling match between Tiger Louis Miller and the bloodthirsty Indian Prince Chewaki failed to rouse the large audience present at the War Memorial auditorium last Thursday evening to the fever heat reached when the affair was being cooked up two weeks before.

To be sure there was a lot of rough action from the start. The Tiger got in some hard digs early in the game and took the first fall with what Announcer Don Borax called a "drop kick," which it emphatically was. Time, 13 minutes.

The second fall likewise was fast and furious, Chewaki landing on top and taking the fall with a body press in two and one-half minutes.

The final fall was something of a comedy of errors. In the opening of the bout there was some swift action during which Miller threw the Prince out of the ring, then followed after him to renew the fight on the floor. Action here went on for several minutes with the spectators striving to keep out of the way. Finally Chewaki broke loose and beat it back into the ring. The Tiger lingered a few seconds and was counted out by referee Herb Waldman and lost the fall and the match because the Prince beat him into the ring.

The fracas was renewed when the pair left the ring and was carried on into the dressing room without the encouragement of an audience.

The semi-final affair was that between Steve Strellich and Ali Baba, the Bib Turk, and it was full enough of thrills to give the fans full value for their money. The Turk won the first fall in 25½ minutes when Steve made a misdirected flying tackle and landed on the floor outside the ring, injuring his hip.

Strellich, in the second bout, took the big Turk up in the air and slammed him to the floor to win the fall in two minutes.

In the third chapter the Turk used gouging tactics on Steve's eyes and was disqualified, giving

the fall and the match to Steve. The Turk was dissatisfied with the decision and attempted to carry on the fight in spite of the referee's decision, but was finally subdued by Steve and a bevy of Legion lads who came to the aid of their country.

Count Joe Varga and John Strellich staged the opening number, which was refereed by our old favorite, ack Larry.

Strellich won the first fall in eight and one-half minutes with a neck lock.

The Count won the second in two and one-half minutes with a backward body slam.

Strellich retaliated by winning the third fall and the match in six minutes with a backward body slam.

On the whole the program did not come up to the high expectations raised in the minds of the fans by the preliminary ballyhoo. Nevertheless, it was a good show.

It was announced that an effort is being made to secure the appearance of Dean Detton, world heavyweight wrestling champion, in the War Memorial auditorium the evening of February 19. If the attempt is successful, there will be a large crowd of sports on hand to see how the champ puts 'em down.
