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to attain the age of seventy (70), shall be condemned by action of the Supreme Court of the State of Nevada, and on her seventieth (70th) birthday said cow shall be deemed to have been killed by the then nearest Railroad, the penalty fee to be paid by the Engineer on duty.

"SECTION 501. All cows and parts of cows in conflict herewith are hereby canned."

STATE BAR BILL

The state bar is due for a shake-up under the terms of a measure offered by the committee on public morals and poor relations. The measure was referred to the Clark and Lincoln county delegation. This startling bill follows:

"An act to amend Section OOG of an act to amend an act to amend another act to amend an act entitled 'An Act to establish the State Bar of Nevada and to repeal all other acts in relation thereto,' approved March 17th, 1911, disapproved March 18th, 1911, reapproved March 19th, 1911, as amended by Chapter X of Psalms, page 797 Gidion, approved March 22nd, 1921, and disapproved March 22nd, 1931.

"The people of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section OOG of the above entitled act, being Section 90,104 N. C. L. 1929, is hereby amended to read as follows:

BAR OF MAPLE

SECTION OOG. The State Bar of Nevada shall be and the same hereby is established in the City of Reno, County of Washoe, State of Nevada.

"Specifications. The State Bar of Nevada shall be made of wood from Nevada Bird's-eye maple; the foot rail and cuspidors from Nevada copper and platinum; the mirrors and glassware from Nevada silicate sands; the footlights, flood lights, headlights, tail lights and lights for electric signs shall be supplied from Boulder Dam Power. All other decorations of every kind and description shall be made from Nevada products.

"Operations. The State Bar Board shall consist of members of the Nevada Supreme Court who have served with good behavior and as instructed until the age of 70. All said retired Supreme Court Judges shall be promoted to the rank of bartenders in chief and shall receive bartenders' wages plus gratuities and free lunch and beer plus a percentage of the profits of the blackjack games running in said Bar.

FREE DRINKS

"All members of the State Legislature shall be entitled to free drinks at said Bar for the period of the Legislative session, which session shall hereafter be held in the card-room at the rear of said State Bar. All members of the State Legislature who shall have the unanimous approval of their respective constituents in writing shall, at the age of 70 and thereafter, be entitled to free lunch in addition to said free drinks.

"All recipients of the Nevada Old Age Pension law shall be entitled to one free drink each day provided, however, that they vote as instructed by the Chairman of the Republi-

can and Democratic State Central Committees.

THEY MUST STAND UP

"The bartenders of said State Bar shall be native born Nevadans, lawyers in good standing or who can stand up and before being employed must pass all the requirements and qualifications set forth in the cosmetology board as to health and general sanitation and said examination shall be held quarterly before the State Bar Board.

State Bar shall be placed in a specified from the operation of said State Bar shall be placed in a special fund to be known as the State Bar Fund and shall be used to create a state institution to be known as the Nevada Correspondence School for Bar Tenders, which shall become a part of the regular curriculum of the University of Nevada. The faculty of the University of Nevada are hereby declared to be honorary members of said Nevada Correspondence School for Bar Tenders.

"All Bars and parts of Bars in conflict herewith are hereby cancelled."

WIRE FOR GOVERNOR

Following consideration of this measure, a telegram, reportedly from the governor, was read. It follows:

"Herewith is transmitted to you an emergency bill with my personal recommendations that you at once upon its receipt consider and declare this to be an emergency and that it be passed and enacted today. This is most urgent and necessary to the welfare and safety of the state of Nevada and its citizens. To protect our fair state from dire and calamitous ruin, I demand that the attached bill be passed at once."

The governor's bill, revolutionary in character, follows in all its alarming detail:

"A bill to protect the state of Nevada, and to make Nevada safe for members of the state legislature.

"SECTION 1. All Bills which have been introduced in either the Senate or the Assembly previous to the passage of this Act, are hereby passed and approved and are declared to be in full force and effect.

ALL APPROVED

"SECTION 2. All Bills, Acts, or parts of Acts, which may have been planned, conceived, intended, premeditated, imagined, dreamed, or considered within the mind, if any, either conscious or subconscious, of any present member of the Senate or Assembly, are all hereby considered to have been properly introduced, and each and every one of such Bills and Acts are now declared to be passed and approved.

"SECTION 3. All Bills and Acts passed by the present session of the Nevada State Legislature, including all those now approved under the blanket authority of this Act, together with all Bills and Acts passed and approved by all past Legislatures of this State, are hereby repealed.

"SECTION 4. The Legislature shall now immediately adjourn, and it is hereby declared to be adjourned, to convene again in and not before the year 1960."

SIT-DOWN STRIKE
