a great dam in the Colorado river. Yet, for Las Vegas, it is just the beginning.

"With the advantages of Boulder Dam power you young men of the Junior Chamber of Commerce have the opportunity of building here a great and beautiful city, one of the most important of the intermountain southwest. We who have carried the torch for all these years during the Boulder Dam development, must soon lay it down. It is for you young men to take it up and carry on as we have striven to do."

A discussion of the possibility of arranging a notable public celebration of the advent of Boulder Dam power on a state-wide scale, was indulged in by the members.

The idea that the advent of Boulder Dam power was not of interest to the city alone, but of the entire state, and that a ceremonial and spectacle in the open air in which all the people could be invited to participate, was put forth.

Following a motion to that effect President Paul Ralli appointed a committee to consider such an event for some date in April or May.

Rotarians Hear Jurists Speak

Las Vegas Rotary Club was honored Thursday noon by the presence of a group of distinguished guests, including Judge Albert Lee Stephens of Las Vegas, judge of the United States District Court for the district of Southern California; Judge E. P. Carville, United States District Attorney for the district of Nevada; Judge James Dysart of Elko, judge of the Fourth Judicial District Court of the state of Nevada; Jake Wainright, probation officer for the United States District Court for the district of Nevada, and Miles Pike, assistant United States Attorney for the district of Nevada.

Judge Dysart, a member of the Elko Rotary Club, spoke pleasantly of his fellow jurists and extended a cordial invitation to Las Vegas Rotarians to visit the Elko club.

Judge Stephens entered upon some reminiscences of the early days of Las Vegas when, in the summer of 1905, he was attorney in a case tried before Justice of the Peace Ralph, a notable character of that day.

Speaking of the wonders of Boulder Dam, he expressed the wish that the great project should not be spoken of as The Dam, because that indicated an obstruction, while in reality the project was entirely creative in character, providing water and power and protection from floods for Imperial Valley and all parts of the southwest.

"You here in Las Vegas don't half rate what you have," Judge Stephens said in suggesting that this region be given the widest possible publicity.

Judge Carville said the northern part of the state still recognizes Las Vegas as part of the state of Nevada. He visioned new prosperity for the entire state through the use of power from Boulder Dam and urged that every possible means be taken to conserve and use in developing the industries of the state the power which is available.

Leslie Edwards made a plea for support of the movement to send a delegate from each Las Vegas troop of Boy Scouts to the National Jamboree, to be held in Washington, and asked that all purchase tickets for the entertainment to be provided next week through the courtesy of Cragin and Pike, when the big band and tumbling team from Glendale, Cal., is to put on a benefit performance in El Portal theatre.

Junior Chamber Nabs Convention

Through the display of admirable energy and enterprise, the Las Vegas Junior Chamber of Commerce obtained the unanimous support of the delegates at the San Diego convention last week in their efforts to bring the regional convention to this city next March.

The victory was won against the eager contentions of four other cities which sought the convention. Hollywood advanced her claims by providing 21 fine vaudeville acts for the San Diego convention. Globe, Arizona, had the wild west and cowboy atmosphere to help her. San Jose made much of her prunes and distributed copious quantities of

prune juice.

Nevertheless, the Las Vegas boys with their inexhaustible pep, managed to enlist the support of practically all the delegates except those from the other candidate cities, whereupon all joined in to make it unanimous.

It is estimated that there will be approximately one thousand visitors to the convention next year and already the members of the Junior Chamber are making preparations to provide them with the finest three-day entertainment it is possible to devise.

Bob Reeder, with the assistance of several others, at the meeting Wednesday evening made a most interesting and humorous account of the various and devious activities by means of which the support of delegates was secured.

Forest Service Men Come Here

Two new forest service men arrived in Las Vegas Tuesday to assume temporary assignments on the Charleston Mountain division of the Nevada National Forest.

Edwin S. England, previously employed on the Cache National Forest on boundary survey work, comes to take over the supervision of recreational construction work as Junior Forester. He has had considerable experience in this type of work and comes well recommended.

Wm. J. Townsend, who is trans-

ferred from the Powell National Forest at Panguitch, comes well qualified to take over the duties of making a game survey of the Charleston Mountain division with a view to a final game management plan being drawn up which will designate the numbers of wild game which are to occupy the mountain without detriment to the natural forage which exists there. It is the plan to maintain as large a wild game population as is able to exist without overgrazing the range or losing any of the animals due to starvation.

Both of these men are graduates of the Forestry School at the Utah State Agricultural College and have been working with the forest service for about three years. While not engaged in the actual job which they are to undertake, they will be assigned to other improvement work on the division.

Owner of Mine Visits Blossom

W. H. Crozier, of Hawthorne, California, was in Las Vegas Wednesday on his way to the Blossom mine near Searchlight.

Mr. Crozier is owner of the mine which is being profitably operated by about twenty men under leases.
