

Annual Dinner Well Attended

The Annual Dinner of Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce Saturday night at the War Memorial building, was attended by approximately 200 members and guests, who enjoyed a fine dinner served by the Ladies' Aid of the First Methodist church.

President O. A. Kimball opened the meeting and introduced A. C. Grant as master of ceremonies. Mayor Leonard Arnett, in behalf of the city, made the address of welcome.

Charles Horrworth, field director of the All-Year Club of Southern California, and Don Thomas, managing director of the club, both made interesting talks on the tourist industry, and gave many striking illustrations of its growth and value to the entire southwest. Mr. Thomas expressed the belief that reasonable prices for accommodations and the absence of price boosting on special occasions is responsible for much of the advantage this region enjoys in the matter of tourist travel.

R. G. Knickerbocker, engineer in charge of the electro-metallurgical laboratory of the government at Boulder City, gave a most interesting and instructive address.

"You need have no fear of lack of ore bodies in this region" Mr. Knickerbocker said. "Our problem is to choose the ones for experimental purposes which will best lend themselves to profitable treatment by Boulder Dam power. You have plenty of them within the 200-mile radius which the dam will serve.

"The great bulk of metals are produced by electrolysis. The electro-thermal processes are under experimentation. Our installation at the government plant is nearly completed. The cost of operating the largest of our electric furnaces will be about \$50 per day."

The experimental plant of which Mr. Knickerbocker is in charge was secured through the efforts of Congressman Scrugham.

Hon. P. A. McCarran, Nevada's junior senator, made the principal address of the evening. It was eloquent and full of fine patriotic fervor.

The senator began his address by recounting some of his experiences on his first visit to the embryo town of Las Vegas in 1905. He called attention to the pitiful condition in which the nations of Europe find themselves and called upon the people of America to stand fast in support of American institutions to which the nations of the world are looking for leadership.

The dinner was preceded by a parade in which the street equipment and fire department of the City of Las Vegas occupied an important place. Floats were entered by the service clubs and by several business organizations. A brilliant illumination feature was provided by two powerful searchlights on a truck which were brought here from Los Angeles.

Following the dinner, colored motion pictures of the Lake Mead-Boulder Dam area were shown, after which the general public enjoyed a dance. Las Vegas high school orchestra provided excellent music.

McNamee Gives Easter Program

At the regular meeting of Las Vegas Rotary Club Thursday noon, Leo McNamee sponsored the program of the day by introducing his guests, Rev. Father Hamilton, from the Monestray near Serre Madre, Calif., and Rev. Father Lamb, of the Church of Joan of Arc, in Las Vegas.

Father Hamilton gave the principal address speaking on Holy Week.

"The rising from the dead is the supreme proof of the divinity of Christ," he said, and concluded by saying, "Christianity is the only power which can stem the tide of red radicalism which is sweeping the countries of Europe today." The entire address was full of religious feeling and was listened to with close attention.

Mr. Anderson, representing the U. S. Forest Service in this section, told of plans of the bureau for establishing winter sports facilities in the Charleston mountain area. He stated that the policy of the service is to provide for the greatest good for the greatest number in the recreational areas.

Harry Gilbert, accompanied by Miss Paulus, gave a beautiful violin number, "The Adoration," which was received with hearty applause. The young violinist is a favorite with Rotarians, who have several times had the opportunity to hear his music.

Bill Ferron, Dave Davis and Walter Bond were appointed the committee to stage an "April Fool" program for next Thursday's meeting. That date will also be celebrated as the fourteenth anniversary of the formation of the Las Vegas Rotary Club.
