# Dr. Lyman Tells Shriners Plan Of His Travels

President Richard R. Lyman, head of the European Mission of the L D. S. church, who is well known in Las Vegas, has been traveling in many of the countries of Europe. In a letter written in London in the latter part of February and published in the Deseret News (Salt Lake City) of Saturday March 27, Dr. Lyman tells many interesting things he experienced in his long travels, writing in an exceptionally intimate and interesting way.

One or two excerpts from Dr. Lyman's letter are of interest to us in the Boulder Dam area.

"At Bruno, Czechoslovakia, I delivered an address before the Anglo-American club on the subject, 'Some Recent Accomplishments in Civil Engineering in the State of California.' In meetings of this club members are permitted to speak only the English language.

"The president of the club above referred to took us the following morning to the Czech Technical University where, under the direction of Professor Bazant and some of his associates, we were shown the work being done in this institution in experimental hydraulics and dam and canal and power plant construction. \* \* \* We were shown a long series of lantern views showing the details of construction of many projects in the United States including the Boulder Dam and many other projects of the United States Reclamation service."




**Teacher Brings Apples to Pupils!**
