Smith Given State Post

Doctor J. D. Smith, local democratic leader, has accepted the post offered him by Governor Kirman as Nevada Director of Unemployment on the national security board. The post carries an annual salary of \$4,200.00.

Dr. Smith a short time ago was endorsed by the local democratic central committee for the post of United States Marshal for Nevada upon the resignation of Harry Gravelle. However, Smith withdrew his name for the marshal's post when offered the security post by the governor.

Utah Protests Power Rate Cut

SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH.—The Utah Water Storage Commission protested against a proposal soon to be considered by congress, for a 50 per cent cut in rates for Boulder Dam electric power.

The commission based its protest on the grounds that the proposed cut would greatly decrease revenue to Arizona and Nevada from the sale of the power, thus hampering irrigation projects in the two states. Both are granted 37 per cent of proceeds from the sale of the power.

The proposed rate cutting measure has been sponsored by California representatives in congress at the urging of their constituents, commission members said. A Utah lobbyist against the proposal will be present when congressional hearings start on the rate cut in Washington, political observers here believed.
