Luxury Liners On Western Air

Whipping across America in fifteen hours and twenty minutes, a mighty Douglas luxury air liner next May 10 will carry a scheduled air lines' insignia on its first three-stop, extra-fare coast-to-coast service.

The speed will be the fastest in the transport line's history.

Built like a sky Pullman, the craft, operated by United Airlines will pause only at Salt Lake City, Cheyenne, Wyo., and Chicago. And for the first time, United and Western Air Express will pool their equipment.

On the Los Angeles-New York run, W.A.E.'s Douglas DC3 will cross the nation, bringing a new air-line name to the East.

Extra fares will compensate for the "sky lounge" fittings of the transport. Originally constructed to seat twenty-one passengers, the Douglas has been rebuilt inside for fourteen travelers, with swivel chairs and rich upholstery. Twenty per cent less pay load will be carried by by United's new liners.

Junior Chamber Elects Officers
