"We came home more than ever impressed with the fact that we have here the best location in the entire west," Mr. Witcher stated.

#### MANY PINON PINES

ARE WINTER KILLED

Some idea of the intensity of the cold weather of the past winter may be gained by the fact that large areas of pinon pine growths between Milford and the Nevada line have been winter-killed, according to S. A. Hutchings, junior ecologist | erside. in charge of the Desert branch experiment station in Pine valley. Mr. Hutchings was in from the station Tuesday and told The News of this condition.

In some places the damage is confined to individual trees or parts of trees, he said, but in others there are whole areas which are turning brown, showing them to have been winter-killed.

The damage has been done, Mr. Hutchings said, not so much by any one drop of temperature but rather by the sustained sub-zero weather of the past winter, the worst on record and perhaps the worst the present growth of pinon pine out west has ever encountered in the untold years of their existence.
