Pioche Power Line Nearing

Work on the steel towers on which the Pioche power transmission line will be carried from the power house over the mountain and across what will soon become an arm of Lake Mead, was started yesterday, according to the announcement made by H. W. Crozier, electrical engineer for the Lincoln County Power District.

The contract, held by the Fred Ziebarth Construction Co., of Long Beach, calls for 12 steel towers, each 75 feet in height, set in concrete foundations. The towers will carry copper cables five-eighths of an inch in diameter and will be completed within 45 days, according to the contract.

The main line construction from Pioche has crossed the Las Vegas-Salt Lake highway near the Las Vegas airport and is making rapid progress. Less than 40 miles of the line remain to be completed.

In addition to the main line, 157 miles in length, sixty miles of branch lines have been completed, including the following:

Delamar, six miles; Caliente, 26 miles; Panaca, three miles; Goldsprings, 25 miles.

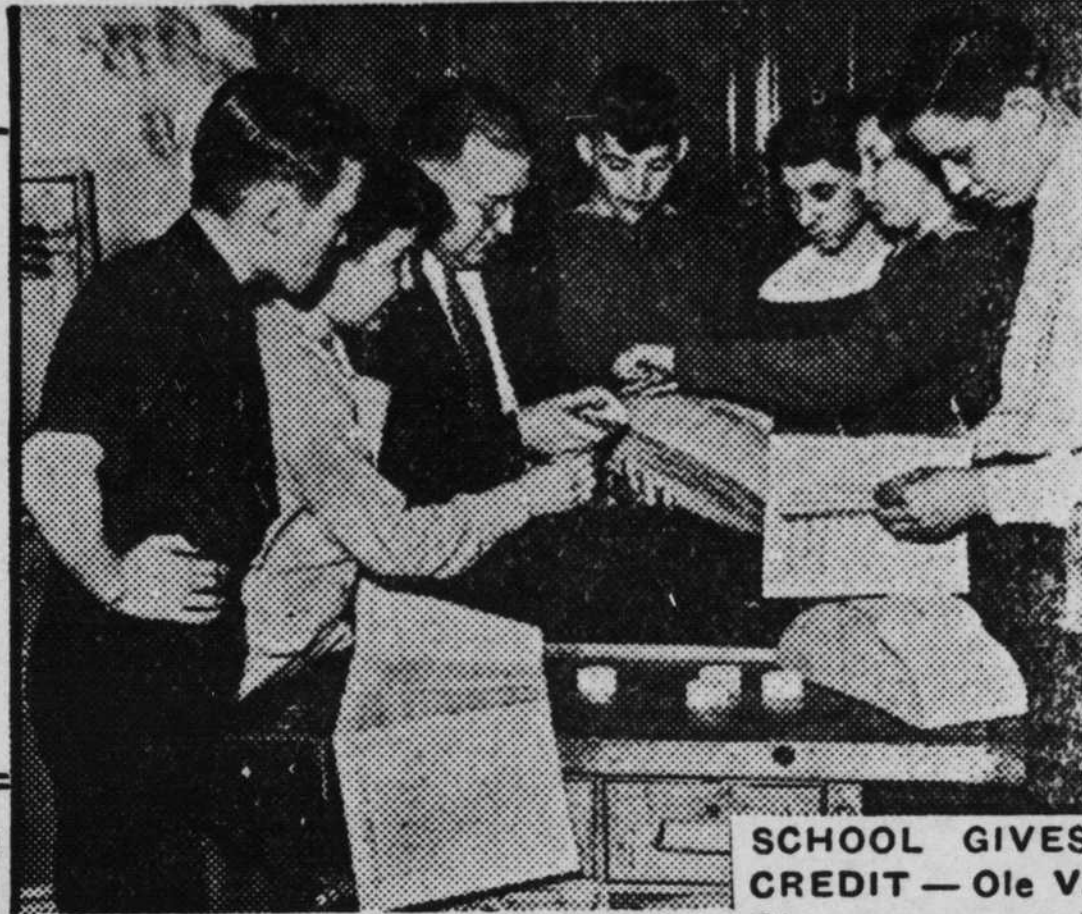
The object of the entertainment is to raise funds to assist in sending Mr. Rowe and his music pupils to Winnemucca next week.

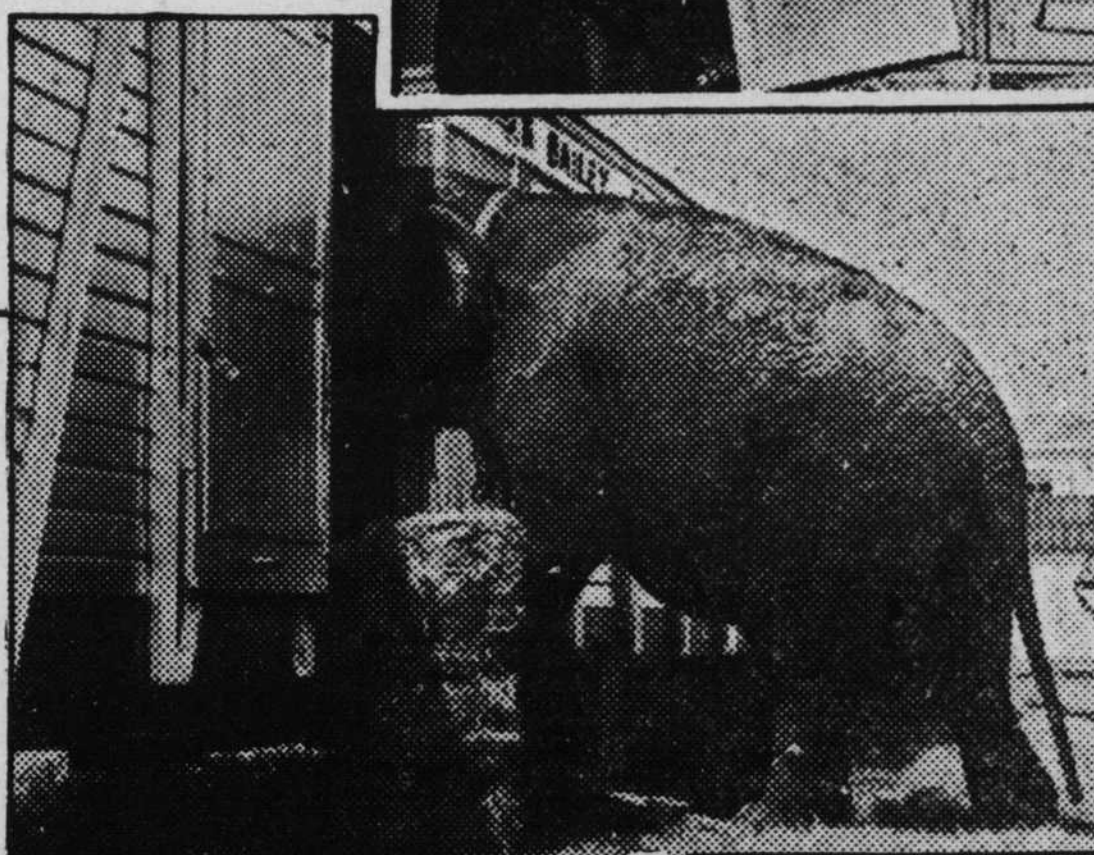

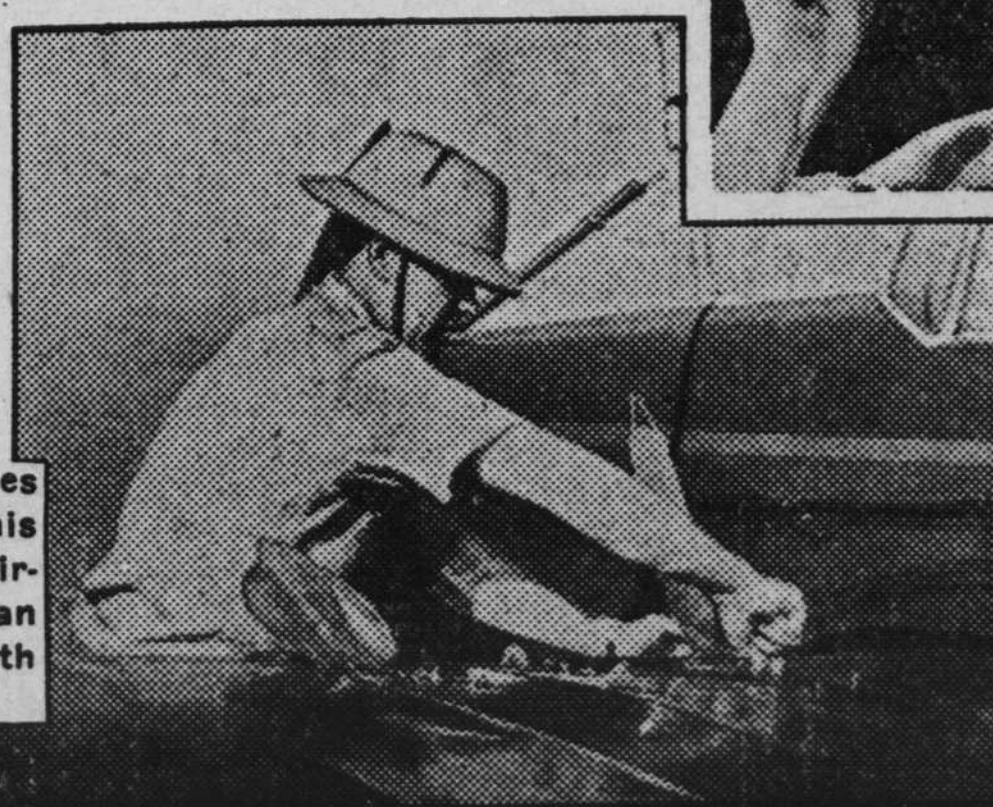
