

# Boys Offered Free Vacations

Two Clark county boys may enjoy a month's vacation with all expenses paid if they can meet the qualifications for entry into the Citizens Military Training Camp at Fort Douglas, Utah.

Twenty boys from Nevada may be vacationists at the camp, of which two are allocated to Clark county. It will be necessary for applicants to act promptly as it is desired to complete the enrollments by May first.

The camp at Fort Douglas will be conducted from July first to July thirtieth. All expenses of transportation to and from the camp, board, lodging, expert medical attention, uniforms, equipment, arms and laundry, will be provided by the government. Applicants for the basic course must be between the ages of 17 and 24; red course, 17 to 25; white course, 18 to 28, and blue course, 19 to 29.

Every candidate will be required to furnish a certificate as to moral character and pass an examination as to physical health. Dr. J. N. Van Meter of Las Vegas and First Lieut. J. R. McDaniels of Boulder City are authorized examining physicians.

Application blanks and full details may be had by applying to Charles P. Squires, county chairman for Clark county at the office of The Las Vegas Age.

The parents of a healthy, enthusiastic boy who wants to go to training camp, should not hesitate to encourage him. He will be well cared for. Under the observing eyes of experienced officers, and non-commissioned officers, he will learn the meaning of discipline and good citizenship. He will develop alertness and self-reliance. He will return home bigger, stronger and better.

His welfare will be carefully guarded. Healthy, wholesome recreation will be provided for the leisure hours.

A visitors' day will be held at each camp when all parents will be welcome and have an opportunity to observe the training given. You are invited to visit the camp on Visitors' Day, or any other time convenient to you and see how your boy lives and learns. You will note the soldierly bearing, the order, the neatness and sanitation required from all. Your boy will be accorded the treatment of a man; and when he returns to you at the conclusion of the camp, he will have developed a larger sense of his responsibility as a future citizen of the United States.

Each camp will have on duty a Surgeon, a Chaplain, a Morale and Recreation Officer and an Athletic Officer, whose duty will be to safeguard the health and moral surroundings of the trainee. Opportunity will be given each trainee to attend religious service of his own creed. The officers and non-commissioned officers on duty at the camps as instructors will gladly assist the trainees in every way possible. Every effort will be made by the camp personnel to make the stay of trainees both pleasant and profitable and to send them home better qualified physically, mentally and morally to meet the responsibilities of citizenship.
