

Ralph Lowry Is Vegas Pioneer

Not many Boulder City or Las Vegas people realize that Ralph Lowry, engineer of the Bureau of Reclamation in charge of Boulder Dam, is one of the few now here who were in Las Vegas before the railroad entry to Las Vegas and, of course, before the birth of the town.

Mr. Lowry was here as a surveyor in the summer of 1904 and worked with J. T. McWilliams in mapping and surveying the "Original Townsite of Las Vegas," which is the McWilliams subdivision, now commonly known as Westside.

New Manganese Method Proved

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — An electrolytic method of recovering manganese from its ore, holding out the hope of utilizing large deposits of low grade manganese ore in this country for steel manufacture, was described before the American Electrochemical Society at its general meeting by Prof. Colin G. Fink of Columbia University.

Dr. Fink, former president of the society, told of obtaining deposits of manganese from a sulphate solution using graphite. Similar work, he said, was being done by the federal bureau of mines in its laboratories at Reno.

Manganese, needed in steel to reduce the bad effect of sulphur, is chiefly obtained in its better grades from Brazil and Russia. In this country, in Colorado, New Mexico, Montana, Nevada, and elsewhere, are extensive deposits of low grade ores, and with fairly cheap electric power in prospect in connection with the Boulder dam development, Dr. Fink said it would be possible to get manganese in quantities from the American ore.

Dr. Fink passed around samples of manganese deposited on copper. He remarked that electro-deposited manganese was hard and resistant to scratching and abrasion.

The question whether manganese would become a substitute for certain other metals such as chromium for plating purposes went unanswered. It was suggested by some of the chemists that it might not necessarily be used as a substitute for chromium but for purposes for which the latter metal is not adaptable.—Denver Mining Record.

Mark Hundred Nevada Towns

Airway markings will be placed in approximately 100 Nevada towns under the WPA this summer, with work on the project to start next week.

"Every town in the state with suitable roofs will be marked with standard symbols and the name of the town," Miss Helen Richey of the bureau of air commerce, department of commerce, who is in charge of the project, announced yesterday.

The markings will include the name of the town, an arrow pointing north, a circle denoting whether the town has an airport, its direction and mileage, and, if the town has no airport, an arrow pointing in the direction of the nearest airport and its mileage. The signs, wherever possible, will be painted in yellow on a black background for visibility.—Nevada State Journal.

Back From Trip To Carson City

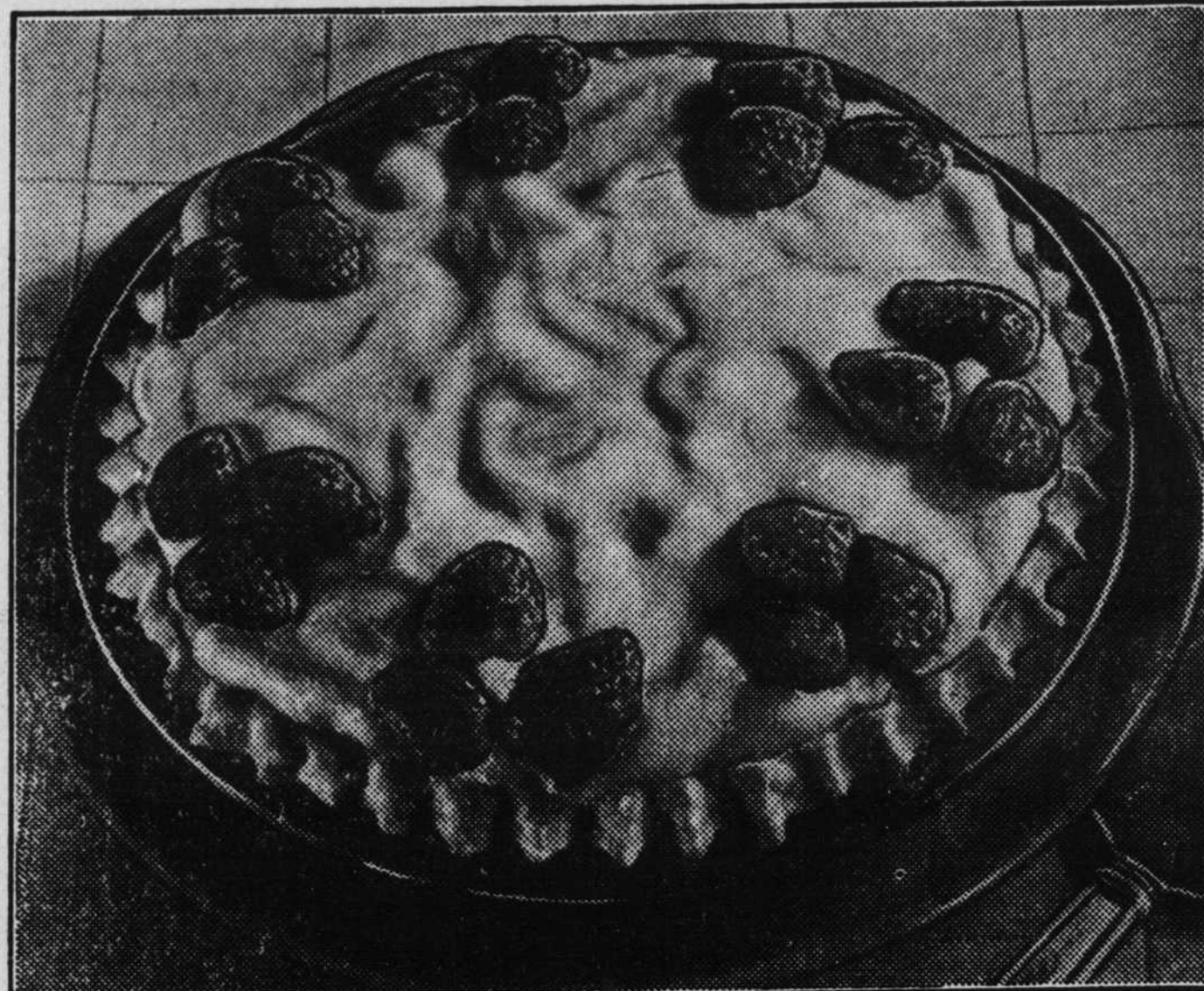
Ed. W. Clark, member of the Colorado River Commission, returned on Thursday evening from Carson City.

While there the commission considered the details of the agreement tentatively agreed upon at Washington and submitted to the Secretary of the Interior.

It is the expectation of the commission that all differences will be adjusted and that an amendment to the Bonneville Dam act will be adopted by congress, making the power provisions applicable to Boulder Dam power.

Mr. Clark expresses the belief that all matters in controversy will be so adjusted that the interests of Nevada in Boulder Dam power will be materially enhanced.

Delicate Summer Pies Always Enchant the Family Palate!



SUMMER pies should be as light as thistledown—from the pastry which melts in the mouth, to the light, refreshing filling. In short, the ideal summer pie should so enchant the palate that diners will consume it with zest even on a broiling hot day.

These pies will bring the season's first berries economically to your table.

Strawberry Sponge Pie

- ½ cup sugar
- 1½ cups strawberries, crushed
- 1 package strawberry-flavored gelatin
- 1 cup hot water
- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 3 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell

Sprinkle 4 tablespoons sugar over berries; let stand 10 minutes. Dissolve strawberry-flavored gelatin in hot water. Drain ¼ cup juice from berries, add to egg yolks, and cook in double boiler until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from fire. Stir gelatin into egg mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat salt and remaining 4 tablespoons sugar into egg whites. Fold lightly into gelatin mixture. Pour into cold pie shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with whole strawberries.

Coconut Cream Raspberry Pie

- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 5 tablespoons cake flour
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk
- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 pint raspberries
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell
- 2 egg whites, unbeaten
- ½ cup sugar
- Dash of salt
- 2 tablespoons water
- ¼ teaspoon vanilla

Combine sugar, flour, and salt in top of double boiler. Add milk and egg yolks, mixing thoroughly. Place over rapidly boiling water; cook 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water; add ½ cup coconut and vanilla. Cool. Place 1 cup berries in pie shell. Add filling.

Place egg whites, sugar, salt, and water in top of double boiler; beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water and beat 1 minute; remove from fire and continue beating 1 minute, until mixture will stand in peaks. Add flavoring. Pile lightly on filling. Arrange remaining berries around meringue. Sprinkle with shredded coconut.
