The only raise in the wage rate setup over that in effect at the present time that was approved by the labor commissioner is as follows:

Common labor, increased from 62 1/2c per hour to 67 1/2c per hour.

Miners, increased from \$5.00 to \$6.00 per day.

Muckers increased from \$4.50 to \$5.40 per day.

Camp cooks and all camp cook helpers were also given a substantial boost in pay.

The manner of rating of trucks was also changed which will result in a substantial increase in pay to truck drivers.

One of the outstanding recommendations of the committee was that the 40-hour week be adopted on all work within this area.

Commissioner Fitzgerald will leave tomorrow to hold other wage scale meetings in the various sections of the state.

Boulder Dam In Film Available

The construction of Boulder Dam, one of the world's greatest engineering feats, is recorded in a four reel sound film made by the Bureau of Reclamation as an official record of this achievement.

The film opens with a view of the Black Canon of the Colorado river as seen when the engineers first went on the job and follows through the construction of the 726-foot block of concrete step by step to its completion. A limited number of prints made from the official negative are available for loan to educational institutions, civic organizations, other groups and theaters.

The sound picture is available in both 35 and 16 mm. film. A silent version of the picture is being prepared in 35 and 16 mm. film and prints of it also will be made available for public distribution on request.
