Realtors of the four southwest states, California, Utah, Arizona and Nevada, will gather in San Francisco June 8, and in Los Angeles June 11, for two great Southwest Regional Conferences, arranged jointly by the National Association of Real Estate Boards and the California Real Estate Association with the San Francisco Real Estate Board and the Los Angeles Realty Board, Inc., as hosts.

Paul E. Stark, Madison, Wisconsin, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, who will be accompanied by a group of national leaders representing the various specialized institutes and divisions of the association, will be the principal speaker at both conferences and at a group of similar meetings to be held throughout California in the coming two weeks.

## Will Transplant Pheasants Here

Word has been received by O. W. Yates, secretary of the Southern Nevada Fish and Game Protective Association, that 500 Chinese pheasants and 500 chukkar partridges will be available to the organization next fall to transplant in the southern part of the state where, investigations show, they will be able to survive.

This word comes from W. L. Douglas, chairman of the Nevada State Fish and Game Commission.

The Association will immediately make plans to care for these birds and investigate the several areas where it has been suggested that they be planted. The work will be done under direction of the Fowl and Upland Birds Committee, of which R. B. Griffith was appointed chairman at a meeting of the executive council last Tuesday.

Other committee chairmen appointed at this meeting were: membership, Paris Stewart; big game, Percy Nash; fish planting, Carl Rau; open seasons, O. W. Yates; publicity, R. C. Anderson. Other committees are to be named at a meeting of the organization which will be held in the near future. The members of the above committees will also be selected and announced at that time.

Persons who desire to act on any of these committees are requested to contact the chairmen of the committees.

It is expected that Dr. Holman, head of the U. S. Biological Survey work in the state of Nevada will be a guest at the forthcoming meeting. He has pledged the support of his organization to the local association.

## Grace Nusser Life Sentence

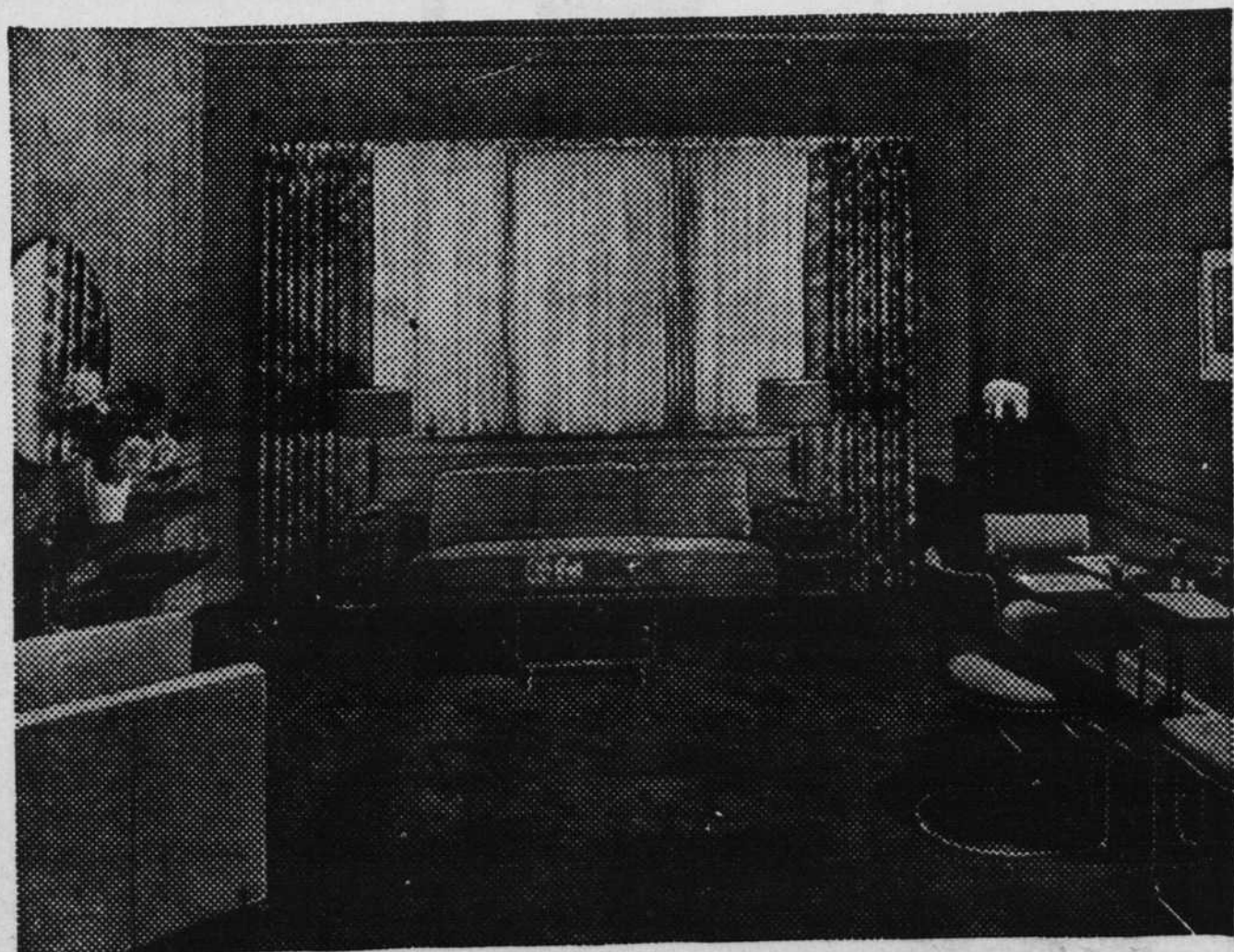
