His body was discovered as it floated face downward, clad in a suit of red pajamas and bedroom slippers, at five o'clock in the morning, by Mrs. E. R. Gates when sne went to inspect the pool which was being refilled after cleaning.

Marshall, who was manager, and Monday, June 14. Attorney J. R. Lewis, the latter having a room in the building in which he kept many of his books and personal effects which were destroyed. There was no insurance and the loss is several thousand dollars.

Mrs. Marshall was saved from serious injury when, as she was running into the burning structure in an attempt to save some of the contents, she was seized and dragged back by Bert Weller of the Mission. Weller's prompt action probably saved her life. As it was, she suffered painful burns on her hands, face and head.
